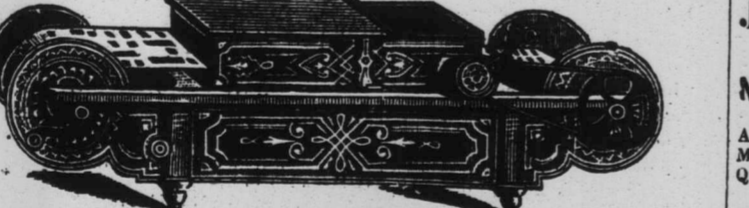

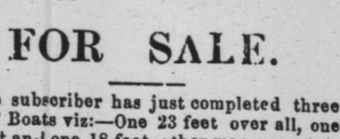

THE SECTIONAL CRY.

An apology is due to our readers for devoting so much attention to the wild utterances of Sir Richard Cartwright. The only one we can give, however, is that the temptation is too strong for us. There is an em. barras de richesses in the gallant knight's speeches to which no amount of patient attention can do justice. He touches all subjects, and impartially muddles them all. Having taken his cue from the organ, Sir Richard has discovered that it is in order to raise the sectional alarm. Unfortunately as usual, he manages to select the worst possible time for doing it. His leader has commenced his martial progress, or rather parade—for he refuses to encounter a foe—in the Maritime Provinces. Down there they are somewhat jealous of Ontario, and nothing will irritate them more than a perusal of this Cobourg deliverance. It seems to be the fate of the Opposition to set the different members of the Confederation by the ears, and certainly if its leaders think they can make anything by so dishonourable a game, by all means let them pursue it.
Sir Richard Cartwright, who culls all his points at second-hand, inveighs against alleged injustice done to Ontario. The purpose of this declamatory rhetoric is not far to seek. There is no real hope of gaining any of the other provinces, with the possible exception of New Brunswick. Manitoba and British Columbia are clean out of the question; therefore it is safe to attack them. They have more representatives, it appears, in proportion to population than they are entitled to. He is opposed to the policy which gives five or six members to British Columbia, and four to Manitoba, besides, it does an injustice to Ontario, which has only eighty-eight, and will soon have an increase equal to either of the straggling Western provinces. The maudlin sympathy with the unfortunate people of Ontario is too transparent in its character to deceive anyone. We are quite able to take care of ourselves, and are strong enough in the House, and out of it, to assert the position to which wealth and population entitle us. Everybody knows that, and the Globe and its financial proteges know that full well. The whole sectional business—an old trick of the party—is a very scurv one, and will not serve their turn either in Ontario or elsewhere.

Of course the everlasting question of territory crops up again, and the intolerable wrong inflicted upon Ontario by saving her the expense of managing lands which may or may not belong to her is again brought forward. For some years to come it would take half a dozen Streams and River bills to keep
