VICTORY IN SHELBURNE

The election for the House of Commons, which took place in Shelburne County, N. S., on the 24th inst., resulted in the return of the Government candidate, Gen. Laurier, by a majority of forty-one votes.

Until about a year ago Shelburne never returned a Liberal-Conservative; but, on the contrary, was always regarded as one of the banner Grit constituencies of the Dominion.

On the 24th inst., a fast freight train ran into the rear of another freight train, instantly killing two brakemen, severely wounding another, and demolishing the engine.

A DIPLOMATIST CAUGHT NAPPING

SIR L. S. SACKVILLE WEST, British Minister of Washington, has been badly imposed upon by a Yankee politician. He received a card from a resident of Pomona, California, who represented himself as an Englishman that had become a naturalized citizen of the United States, and who wished to obtain the minister's advice as to whether or not he should vote for Cleveland, and wishing to get an expression of opinion as to Mr. West's ideas of Cleveland's motives in sending his letter to the minister.
