Festival of Empire.

LETTER FROM MR. OUTERBRIDGE.

Newfoundland Exhibition First Opening.

The Evening Telegram thanks W. G. Gosling, Esq., Secretary of the local Committee of the Festival of Empire, for a copy of a letter from J. Outerbridge, Esq., who is directing the work of the local Committee at the Crystal Palace.

NEWFOUNDLAND BUILDING FIRST OPENED.

London, May 19, '11.

The Secretary of the

Festival of Empire Committee. Dear Sir—I sent you a short telegram some days ago, in reply to yours, asking about the opening of the Festival of Empire. I will now give a brief account of the Newfoundland Exhibit. The last 8 cases arrived yesterday and have been unpacked. The previous 11 cases were a long time on the way, as the Allans sent them around by coastal steamer and missed the first opportunity after their arrival at Glasgow. However, the Newfoundland building was the only one open to the public on the 12th. It has since been closed, waiting for the other exhibits, the completion of the Reid Co. pavilion, and the roadways around the building, but when the exhibits, which arrived yesterday, are in place, and Reid's pavilion finished, all will be ready, and I think the Colony may be congratulated on having a good show.

REID-NELCO, CO. PAVILION.

On entering the building, the first object which strikes the eye is the Reid-Nelco, Co. pavilion, on the front of which will be placed four or five of the best caribou heads. Between the door and this pavilion will be the sporting camp and fishing village models. On the right hand side, about 11 feet from the front wall, stands the great mahogany case, containing the family of caribou—a very fine exhibit. Corresponding in position on the left hand side are the Harnsworth models of the Grand Falls mills and paper making machines, and between these, great rolls of paper. A handsome brass railing surrounds these models.

SEALS AND CARIBOU.

Between the caribou-family case and the pillar are the great hood and other seals, supported upon stands covered with white. On the wall over the entrance is a magnificent painting of St. John's Harbor, 22 ft. x 15. Except where large pictures and diagrams occupy the space, there is a double row of enlarged photos, and some oil paintings all around the walls above the mahogany cases.

ROPEWALK EXHIBIT.

On the left of the entrance against the wall stands the handsome Rope-walk exhibit. In the centre of the right wall over the door is the diagram giving the remarkable statistics of the Colony, and on either side of this are the large maps of Newfoundland and the Labrador.

WHALES AND HALIBUT.

Around the right column are arranged models of sealing and whaling steamers and the big halibut. Around the left column is our timber

exhibit, which presents a very fine appearance. On the far side of the centre pillars, ranged from right to left with spaces between, is a double row of flat cases containing the minerals and polished stones, etc., some of which are very beautiful.

ANIMALS AND MINERALS.

Between these cases are large specimens of coal, granite and gypsum. The wall cases extending all round the building contain the Agricultural exhibit, wild birds and animals, wool and other skins. The case containing seal skins and bags, purses, etc., is a very interesting exhibit, and I think that will attract general attention.

SPORTSMEN'S ATTRACTIONS.

The case containing salmon and trout is a magnet for sportsmen. The display is fascinating, and I have no doubt many visitors will be attracted to the island by it. I did not know that more salmon were coming when I telegraphed. I think we have sufficient both salmon and trout now.

BELL ISLAND DEPOSITS.

Against the back wall stands the Nova Scotia Steel Co. exhibit, a pyramid case containing a diamond drill, core of Bell Island and ore, 14 feet high, taken nearly three miles from the island and about 1,000 feet under the water. This pyramid is flanked by cases containing specimens of iron and steel, some of the latter in the shape of tools with the highest possible finish.

NEWFOUNDLAND'S ARTIST.

On the left wall of the building are 10 paintings, lent by Miss Macpherson, and we also have a number of small paintings by Mr. Milhais. The most attractive beauty of the show, however, is a large painting of the Codroy River and banks, with high hills in the background. This picture is placed over the back door of the building, and is 23 ft. by 15 ft. It is a very beautiful scene. This and the two others of similar size referred to were painted in Paris last year.

LADY NORTHCLEFFE'S KINDNESS.

Sir E. P. Morris was at the building yesterday, and I understand he expressed himself as much pleased. I was in town at the time attending an executive meeting of our Pageant Committee. It was found impossible to get more than a very few people connected with Newfoundland who could and would take part in the Pageant, so we had to arrange for others, and as they could not be expected to provide their own costumes, an amount has been subscribed by a few. Mr. Marriott is treasurer, and he has £57 in hand. We are much indebted to Lady Northcliffe in this matter, as besides a very liberal subscription, she arranged for 35 young men from the Daily Mail Office to take part in the Newfoundland scene of the Pageant.

Mr. Howley has been unremittent in his work in arranging the exhibits. Mr. Swift was employed as a working foreman. His time is now up, and he leaves to-morrow.

JOINT ARRANGEMENT.

A joint arrangement will probably be made for a gentleman from the Daily Mail Office to look after the Harnsworth exhibit and to assist Mr. Howley. None of the other Colonial buildings are open to the public yet, but in a few days I think all will be ready.

I will not attempt any description of the Crystal Palace exhibition or the opening ceremonies. You will find all these in the newspapers. All the contractors and decorators had undertaken more than they could accomplish in the time, and my whole time during the past two months has been devoted to endeavoring to get our building and arrangements ready. Missionary Meeting.

The service held in the Congregational lecture hall last night was unique and inspiring. Hymn 379 was heartily sung, whereupon the pastor, Rev. Joseph Thackeray, read the lesson. Rev. Mr. Haldane then offered prayer. The singing of hymn 568 introduced Rev. F. W. McCallum, B.A., of Marash, Turkey. He delivered a graphic lecture on the conditions existing in Turkey amongst the Mohammedans and gave a thrilling account of the massacre of Christians that took place about two years ago. The fidelity of the martyrs was described in touching terms. Of the young Turks who had been educated in the Christian College for Christian missionary work, twenty fell victims on that occasion. After another hymn had been sung, Mrs. Butler, from Central India, came forward and in choice language gave her experience in helping to spread Christianity in that country. Mrs. Butler described the difficulties that the caste system entailed in working amongst the Hindus. However, in spite of this Christian missionaries were gaining ground, especially the Christian Endeavour Society and Epworth League. Both lectures proved a unique treat and the audience were highly pleased. Rev. Mr. Thackeray, at the conclusion, thanked the speakers for their kindness in affording the people of his congregation such an inspiring treat. He would like to take advantage of the occasion to tender to the workers in Turkey and Central India the greetings of the Epworth League and Christian Endeavour Society of Newfoundland. The meeting closed with a hymn and Benediction.
