Insane Woman.

At 4.50 p.m. yesterday Head Const. Dave and Sergt. Savage were called to a house in an alleyway off George Street, where a spinster named Kesiah Milley resided. The woman lived in much poverty and alone, and it had been reported to the officers that the house was on fire. They could not gain admittance when they called, but broke in the door and found the place filled with smoke from faulty stove fittings and pipes. It was feared that the woman might accidentally fire the place and the officers took her to the station. At 6 p.m. she was examined by Dr. Cowperthwaite, pronounced insane and will be sent to the Asylum.

Delayed Express Arrived.

The Bruce express which has been on the way from Port aux Basques since Friday last, arrived here at 8 last night bringing a number of passengers and a large mail. The train hands report great falls of snow along the country and the men had a continuous snow fight the drifts being from 10 to 20 feet high. A terrific blizzard occurred Saturday night and continued all Sunday and never before did the train hands have such an experience. Intense frost prevailed and the train could not move. Coming from Placentia Junction the train had a double header and a plow was used.

Gave Trouble.

Yesterday afternoon the Stella Maris was ready to sail for the North but a number of stokers who had been signed on came on board "all lit up" and caused much trouble. The police was called and put the men ashore when others were engaged and later they boarded the ship in a similar condition and also had to be removed from the vessel. The union will, no doubt, deal in a drastic manner with these men whom the union selected to go in the ship.

Placentia Ice-Blocked.

Conditions which have not occurred for twenty years before exist in Placentia Bay to-day. The bay and harbor are filled with heavy slob ice and the Home and Invermore can't get to port. The steamer Morien, from Louisburg, is due with coal to the Reid Nfd. Co., and may have to come to St. John's to discharge. No water could be seen yesterday from Point Verde lighthouse.

Yet Jammed.

Yesterday Messrs. A. J. Harvey & Coy. sent a message to Botwood for news of the Tritonia. The ship at present is about 8 miles from Botwood and every effort is being made to get her to her destination. The dynamite which was sent forward from St. John's is being used daily to blow up the ice which in places is nearly 3 feet thick.

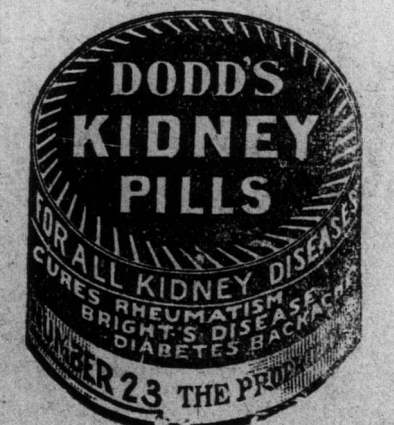
VICTORIAS ROUT ST. BON'S.

Last night another large audience assembled in the Prince's Rink to see the struggle between the Victorias and St. Bon's teams, but were sorely disappointed as from start to finish the game was one-sided and resulted in a walk over for the Vics. by 9 goals to 2. Some of the St. Bon's team might as lief been out with the spectators for all they did for their team, and those who did work, of course were up against heavy odds. In the first half matters were pretty well contested, Parsons scoring the first goal for the Vics after 28 minutes' play, and D. Walsh equalized just before the half closed, and the teams crossed with 1 goal each.

SECOND HALF.

When this half opened the Vics. were on St. Bon's goal and bombarded it for a while. Walsh, however saved well and Golden retaliated for St. Bon's, but could not beat Nix. After about 10 minutes' work Bulley ran east, and passing to McPherson he sent in No. 2 for the Vics, followed by Nos. 3 and 4 a few minutes afterwards. St. Bon's bucked up a little but it was too late. Golden made several good attempts to score, failing, however, and soon after it practically rained goals for the Vics. McPherson now scored 2 goals in a few minutes, and though St. Bon's again quickened their pace their efforts were futile, and R. Shortall and Parsons scored Nos. 7 and 8 for the winners. D. Walsh now did some good work for St. Bon's and notched up their second goal. In a scrimmage Bulley scored for the Vics, and the game terminated—Victorias, 9 goals; St. Bon's, 2. Mr. E.
