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### Wedding Fees. Facts about Marriage Information

Agents.

The marriage industry is still one of the most profitable business in America, according to statistics printed in New York. Quite a substantial sum is made by "marriage runners" and "marriage information agents," the latter peculiar profession owing its existence to laws passed in New Jersey and a few other States forbidding justices of the peace to perform marriages.

The New Jersey J.P.,s, in particular. have been very loath to give up their lucrative business, and nearly all of them still keep their "runners" to look for applicants for licenses, directing them to clergymen, and supplying them with witnesses. The New York newspapers contain plenty of advertisements as follows: "Marriages quietly performed, strictly confidential, private," the authors of which are J.P.'s, who have no authority to perform the marriage cere-If you would have your eyes accurmony, but who are willing to pocke. fees, which vary according to the wealth and position of the applicants for making all arrangements and find-

ing a discreet clergyman. Of course, the law prevents any bogus weddings, and there cap be no secrecy about New Jersey ceremonics, for the licensing clerk's records have to be published and the officiating clergyman must make returns within ten days; but that eloping couples find these "marriage information agents" useful is testified to by clergymen who are by no means averse to having their names on the list of a justice of the peace.

One Hoboken minister admits that through the exertions of the justices Laundry work. and their runners he was provided with fifty couples during the month of December, whom he duly married. In twenty-three cases the witness was a man employed by one of the advertising justices, and in nineteen others the witness was the clergyman's housekeeper.
