### The Fall of Antwerp.

Details of the fall of Antwerp are still meagre. It will be remembered that Secretary Harcourt in his message to the Governor on Saturday stated that the War Office had announced that the Belgian forces evacuated Antwerp on the previous day. Naturally this evoked anxiety as to the whereabouts and size of the evacuating forces and as to the size of the forces which had been left behind to mask or cover the evacuation. At the time of writing there is more information than there was on Saturday, but not very much. From Amsterdam comes the story that the Germans captured 20,000 prisoners at the fall of the city. From the same place comes the news that the main British and Belgian forces with King Albert have reached Ostend safely. From London comes the news that three naval brigades, 8,000 men, with heavy guns, had been sent to Antwerp, and that two of the brigades reached Ostend safely, while the third was cut off in East Flanders, and had found safety in Dutch territory, where they will be held until the end of the war. The losses out of the 8,000 naval men are given at 300. The total loss appears to be 2,300, two thousand of whom are in Dutch territory and will not be available for use in the war. It would appear from this that the attempt of the Germans to cut off the main army failed, and that although the Germans reached Bruges, British and French troops were in sufficient forces to repulse some 20,000 German troops further East than Bruges. The amount of news is so small that we naturally look for more. If only 20,000 prisoners have been taken at Antwerp and if the evacuating army has reached safely at Ostend, with such a small loss as is set forth in the messages yet to hand, the losses in connection with the fall of Antwerp may be regarded as light.

### Belgian Grey Book.

Last Thursday the Belgians issued in London copies of the Belgian Grey Book, which contains the correspondence relating to the violation of Belgian neutrality. On July 24th, the day the Austrian ultimatum was delivered

the Government of His Majesty the King of Prussia. "Belgium has always faithfully observed her international obligations; she has fulfilled her duties in a spirit of loyal impartiality. She has neglected no opportunity to maintain her neutrality and to cause it to be respected by others. The attack upon her independence with which Germany menaces her is a flagrant violation of the law of nations. No strategic interest can justify the violation of that right.

"The Belgian Government, by accepting the propositions mentioned, would sacrifice its national army and betray at the same time its duty toward Europe.

"Conscious of the role which Belgium has played for more than 80 years in the civilized world, it refuses to believe that its independence can only be preserved at the price of a violation of its neutrality.

"If the Belgian Government be disappointed in its expectations, it is resolved to repulse by every means in its power any attack upon its rights."

Germany invaded Belgium in disregard of the Treaty to which she was a party. Great Britain called upon her to respect the treaty and on her refusal declared war. To-day Belgium is the innocent victim of the despotic Germany who had no quarrel with her, nor she with Germany, until Germany violated her independence. To-day she stands despoiled of her capital, her chief port, her fortresses, and her land has been laid waste by the ruthless hand of the modern Hun. But a time is coming when the ruthless invader will be driven back and made to pay so far as is humanly possible, for his reckless spoliation.
