"That would be a paying investment?"



By which criterion do you do your buying, mistress of the household purse strings? It is usually the senior member of a business firm who does the buying, because the success of the business depends so largely on wise buying. In the matrimonial partnership, however, it is usually the junior partner (I suppose we should be called that) who does the largest part of the household buying.

The firm's success may depend on your buying. The sums she handles may not be large, but, since they represent the majority of the firm's income, they should be handled with care and thought and study and not with haphazard impulsiveness.

Too many women are influenced by the vague feeling that this or that household utensil would be nice to have. Too few look at any piece of equipment they are asked to buy with a cold business-like eye and consider, "Will this be a paying investment? Will this save me enough work or give me enough pleasure to be worth to me the interest on the money it costs plus the sum needed to replace it?"

Take for instance a clothes wringer. That will be used every week. It will save at least fifteen minutes of time, some wear and tear on the

clothes and much strength. If it costs four dollars and lasts ten years (with proper care it should), that means that the cost of replacing will be forty cents a year and the interest on money invested sixteen cents, making a total of fifty-six cents, a little over a cent a week. From the most business-like point of view that is surely a good investment.

Clothes Are Also an Investment.

Clothes should also be considered in the light of an investment. A gown, no matter how attractive and low priced, is not a good buy unless you will wear it enough before it goes out of fashion to make it a paying proposition. Is there not right now at least one "mistake" hanging in your wardrobe which you would not have bought if you had considered it cold bloodedly as an investment?

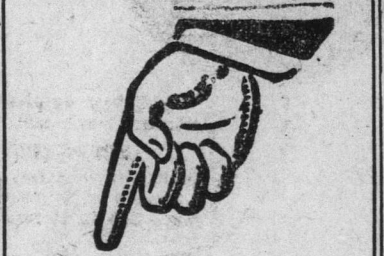
The housekeeping woman sometimes envies the business woman her chance to use her brains.

Wheat From Vladivostok.

Preparations for Heavy Shipment—Channel Clear of Ice.

Washington, April 5.—The Russian Government is preparing to export through Vladivostok 350,000 tons of wheat from the Osk (Siberia) district, where there was a large crop this year. Vladivostok has no facilities for handling such an amount of cargo, but as it is the only port from which the shipment can be made, temporary moorings and storehouses are being constructed.

All temporary moorings are to be connected with the railway by spurs. Warehouses covering 190,000 square feet have been begun and are to be finished within forty-five days, but as the ground is frozen several feet the work is attended with some difficulty. This will increase the warehouse capacity of the port by 100,000 tons per month.

There will be required about fifty ships, depending of course on their size, and it will probably take two months to ship the 350,000 tons. This will mean a large number of steamers coming here empty or with a light cargo and an immense number of empty freight cars going from here to western Siberia or European Russia, thus furnishing good facilities for the importation of American goods via this port, writes the United States Consul at Vladivostok. A number of large British ships have arrived from New York via the Panama Canal, and the wharves are all occupied; however, so far no American ships have arrived. This has been an unusually severe winter, and for some days doubt was expressed as to the ability of the ice breakers to keep the harbor open, but at no time was the channel entirely closed. The ice field extended further out to sea than usual, being sometimes as far as thirty miles out, and one ship was held about twenty-five miles out for four days.

EARLY STRAWBERRIES.

And, having consumed them in sorrow and woe, and having entombed them, they buoyantly go, and tell of the splendor of berries and cream, so luscious, so tender, an epicure's dream! Thus truth is all bogged and shorn of its bloom, thus men are homewogged and led to their doom!

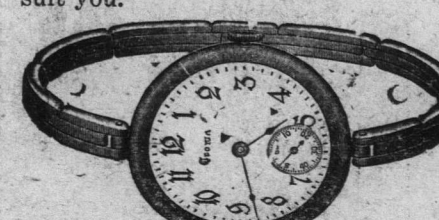
