

DRINK MILK FOR FLESH.

The milk diet is the best flesh proucer that I know of. Drink a couple of glasses of hot water when arising and fifteen minutes later eat half a thereon!' dozen prunes that have soaked all night in warm water. Also drink the prune juice. Fifteen minutes after this take a glass and a half of milk and, thereafter, take the same amount every hour until late in the afternoon Eat your evening meal as usual, let-

ting it consist of plainly cooked foods. Do not drink the milk hurriedly, but remember that it has just as much nourishment as beefsteak and requires the same amount of chewing. Swish the milk around in the mouth; before swallowing, as in this way it is almost entirely digested before it

reaches the stomach. Do not take milk too cold but let it stand until the chill is off. Also do not drink it too close to bedtime, rather get up a little earlier in the morning.
