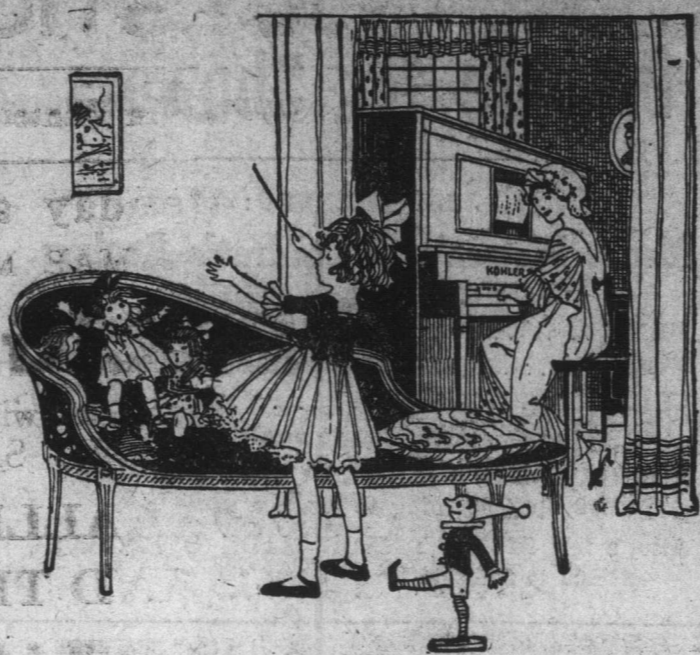

### Captain Lewis Vindicated.

The Magistrate's Court yesterday was crowded to hear the much talked of case of Captain Walter Kennedy vs. Capt. John Lewis, Philip Lewis and Edward Butler. The complainant, who is one of the Squires candidates for Harbor Main District, summoned the three defendants for an alleged assault committed upon him at a public meeting held at Holyrood by himself and his colleagues, Mr. Meaney, on the 14th instant. Newspaper reports of the affair had painted it in such colours that it was supposed to have been a most brutal and unwarranted attack. The evidence showed another story. A large number of witnesses were summoned by both sides, and the hearing occupied up till 6 p.m. Mr. McNelly appeared for the complainant, and Higgins, K.C., for all defendants. It developed that Kennedy had been publicly stating that Captain Lewis was a Government official, that he was canvassing against the Squires team, and that he had kept the people of Holyrood from attending the meeting in question, there being only a handful present. All three statements were shown yesterday to be without foundation. The evidence further showed that Capt. Kennedy himself began the trouble, that Capt. Lewis never assaulted him, that his son Philip had only come to the rescue of his father, and that Butler had got into the mixup with the idea of restoring order. His Honor Judge Morris in dismissing the charge against Capt. Lewis, stated that he had more cause for complaint than any other person because of the manner in which his name had been used throughout the district without any justification, and that his son had only acted as might be expected when his father's good name was at stake and when he was threatened with assault. He made a nominal fine of one dollar in the case of the son, and five dollars against Butler. He regarded the whole case as a "tempest in a teapot."

At the conclusion of the case the many friends of Capt. Lewis present offered him their congratulations upon the splendid vindication which he secured.—News.
