

#### Woman Suffrage.

MEETING AT HARBOR GRACE. A deputation from the Newfound and Women's Suffrage League arrived here from St. John's on Tuesday afternoon last says the Harbor Grace Standard of Friday last, August 11th, to lay before the citizens here the fairness and wisdom of the women of Newfoundland obtaining the power to vote, a right already possessed by the women of the Mother land, Canada, the United States, New Zealand and many other countries. The deputation arrived here at 3.40 p.m. in two motor-cars having left St. John's in the early forencon. The members were, Mesdames Allan Fraser, Charles Hutton, Vincent Burke, Hector McNeil, Eric Ayre and Misses Southcott, McNeil, Crocker and Kennedy. They proceeded immediately to the Town Hall, the place of meeting. The attendance, owing perhaps to the week being Regatta week, to the hour being one of worka-day operations in homes and factories, and of preparation for the forthcoming yearly picnic, was doubtless much smaller than it otherwise would have been. The chair was, on request, taken by Mrs. Higgitt who most pleasingly introduced the different speakers in turn. The addresses were interesting and the subjects, such as Child Welfare, the Reformation of Youth, Education, Nursing, were ably handled, and the point made that, if only the female half of the country were given the same right to deal with those and other matters affecting the good of the home and the general good of women that the male half possess, there would be wonderful progress made in these affairs. At the close a hearty vote of thanks proposed by the ladies of the delegaion, was unanimously given Mrs. Higgitt for so admirably filling the chair, and to Judge Oke for placing the hall at their disposal for the meet-
