THROWS OFF CULT.

Tut-Ankh-Amen succeeded him to the throne of Egypt through his marriage with the daughter of Amenhetep IV., but very soon after he began to reign he saw that the cult of Aten was doomed. He promptly eliminated the name of Aten from his own title and that of his wife, and moved hi apital back to Thebes

There he proceeded at once to und the evil which his father-in-law had perpetrated in the city. In a very short ime the city of Aakhuenaten was deserted and fell into ruin and the old worship of Amen was set on a firmer basis than ever before, if possible, by Tut-Ankh-Amen.

Lord Canarvon's discoveries will no doubt threw a great light upon the reign of Tut-Ankh-Amen and on the continuation of the artistic development that began about this period. It is clear, from the large amount of funerary furniture that has been found that the eld cult was observed in great detail, but there are many other objects mentioned which await further examination. 

HOW TOMB IS ENTERED.

On entering the tomb, one descend first a flight of 16 steps, averaging \$14 | nearly 45 degrees and the width of the stair 516 feet.

Beyond'a wide deorway, formerly a site to the north of Assiut, which is blocked up, is a passage 26 feet leng and 61% feet high, and of the same width as the stair. Then, through another doorway similar to the first, lies the first chamber, 12 by 26 feet, and 81/2 feet high It was this chamber that the explorers first entered and found so packed with articles and material, even to the very door, that one Egyptologist was moved to exclaim: "We

> fore! This remarkable discovery, the most sansational of the century, is the reward of patience, perseverence and perspicuity. For more than 16 years Lord Carnaryon, with the assistance

of Howard Carter, has been carrying out excavations on that part of the site of ancient Thebes situated on the west bank of the Nile, at Luxor.

Seven years ago, work was started in the Valley of the Tombs of the Kings. For a long time the excavators had little success. The work was exceedingly costly and Lord Canarvon is reported, on several occasions, to have contemplated abandoning it.

But Mr. Carter was possessed of some sixth sense that insisted that comewhere, in that mound of rubbish, was the leng-lost tomb of Tut-Ankh-Amen. He insisted and entreated to be allowed to continue.
