OFFERING BONDS OF PAPER-BOARD CO.

Spanish River Pfd. 117

A bond secured by assets valued at over 3 1-2 times the outstanding amount and with earnings of the issuing company running nearly four times interest requirements, is being offered to investors in the 7 per cent First Mortgage bonds of the Canadian Paperboard Company, Limited, through Johnston and Ward's

From a letter of Mr. F. G. G. Kerry, President, it is noted that the company is the largest manufacturer in Canada of all grades of paperboard-turning out 25 per cent, of the requirements of the Canadian trade. Mr. Kerry makes some interesting comments on the consumption of paperboard in Canada and the United States as compared with newsprint pointing out that in Canada the annual consumption of paperboard is approximately 100,000 tons per annum as against 115,000 tons of newsprint, and in the United States 2,100,-000 tons per annum as against 2,750.-000 tons of newsprint.

That the industry is an important one is seen from a study of these figures. Presumably, the reason the public is not more familiar with it is that the companies producing paperboard, such as the Eddy Company, Booths and the Canadian Paperboard Company, are largely privately owned. In the bonds of the last named company, the public is given almost its first opportunity of purchasing securities of the companies operating in this industry.

COTTON IN TRADING POSITION WHILE AWAITING NEW CROP DEVELOPMENT.

(From Financial Service of May 13th) The situation in the cotton market is so thoroughly complex and uncertoin that it is virtually impossible to take an intelligent position in the arket at present. For the time beng at least, we can advise nothing nore than a trading position, o.e., elling on fair rallies and buying on

Prevailing factors are so evenly divided on the bullish and bearish sides that it is probable that only the appearance of some new influence will be able to carry the market out of its present trading rut and cause prices to adopt a decisive trend in one direction or another. Inasmuch as the bullish old-crop statistical position and the bearish cotton goods trade situation have been largely discounted, it appears that this influence will have to come from the new crop.

A 1924-25 American crop at least 2 000,0000 bales larger than that produced in the 1923-24 season is required. If concrete evidence appears that the necessary increase will be made, cotton prices would doubtlessly drop somewhat below current levels. If, on the other hand, planting continues to make slow progress and the indications point to a yield of less that 12,000,000 bales, values would in all probability develop renewed strength. Weather conditions in the Southern growing belt during immediately future weeks will largely determine the situation.

The strength which came into the cotton market during the early part of April has failed to hold and prices are now back to practically the same levels which obtained before the recovery developed.
