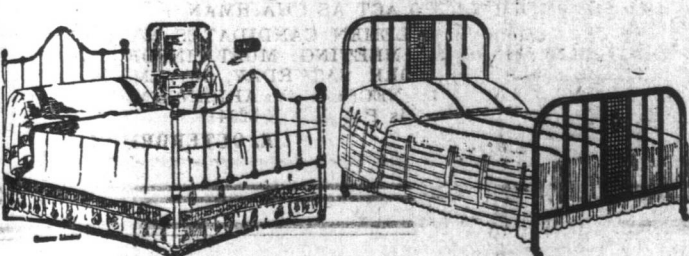
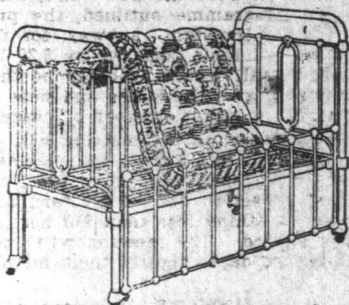

STUDEBAKER CORPORATION.

BOSTON, Nov. 7.—Increase in the

regular dividend rate on Studebaker common from \$4 to \$5 basis is the strongest gesture of confidence in continued prosperity and in the future of the industry, for the Studebaker management would never have O.K'd a change in the regular rate had it not great faith in the outlook for the balance of the year. Despite sustained earning power there has been no change in the dividend policy of Studebaker since 1923 when following the 25 per cent. stock dividend of 1922, the then capitalization of 750,000 shares was placed on a \$10 basis, same rate of disbursement prevailing after stock was split up 2 for 1 in 1924.

The combination of an increased regular rate and an extra disbursement may be interpreted not only as evidence of sound prosperity but of the likelihood that Studebaker has completed its expansion programme. Handing of such resources for past two years has been for purpose of investing surplus funds in the rounding out of its South Bend manufacturing unit. Studebaker has resources of over \$100,000,000 now and is presumably content with the size of its investment in the business.

Earnings for the third quarter of the year established a new high record for the period. Net profits of \$5,035,177 after taxes were equal after preferred dividends to \$2.51 a share on the 1,875,000 shares of common and compared with the previous third quarter record in 1923 when net was \$4,855,080. Dollar sales in the third quarter of the present year were also slightly better than in 1923, totalling \$46,430,492 against \$46,372,646 in the earlier period. Number of cars sold was slightly below the 1923 record with total of 39,574 against 40,685. That earnings and sales were new records on the smaller number of cars sold, reflects the shift from open to closed models in the past two years.

For the first nine months of 1925 the corporation's earnings were \$15,157,236, equal to \$7.85 a share on the common. This total has been exceeded in the nine months period of 1923, when the corporation earned \$15,226,254, and in 1922, when earnings were \$15,440,374.

With some increase in business during October compared with September, all indications are that the fourth quarter this year will exceed the corresponding quarters of these years and establish 1925 total earnings at a new high record. Indications are that Studebaker will earn upward of \$19,000,000 for the year, leaving a balance approaching \$10 a share for the common.

Improvement in the balance sheet this year has been impressive. Cash of \$19,338,325 compares with \$5,813,717 in 1924 when corporation was borrowing \$5,000,000 from banks. At present there are no bank loans outstanding. At the same time inventories have been reduced from \$28,622,399, to \$21,662,695.

Each has his host of supporters who will doubtless turn out in large numbers to cheer their favorite to victory. The indoor record for five miles in the Prince's Rink is held by Ron O'Toole, his time being 27 minutes 22 1/2 seconds, on Dec. 7th, 1922. John Bell and Gower Stone are showing up wonderfully well in practice, and are considered strong contenders for the race on Monday night.
