THOMAS WALLACE.

(H. F. Shortis)
By the death of Mr. Thomas Wallace which occurred at the residence of his brother Patrick, yesterday morning, St. John's has lost a well known and highly respected citizen. Fortified by all the rites of Holy Mother Church he passed peacefully to rest.

Thomas Wallace was born in St. John's 25 years ago and was the son of the late William Wallace so well and favorably known in the community and one of the earliest members of the Star of the Sea Association. At a very early age the deceased entered the employ of Messrs. Job Brothers & Co., and for a period of 55 years held responsible positions in the above employ and few men possessed more thorough knowledge of commercial and maritime events than did the deceased gentleman. Endowed with a retentive memory and possessing considerable descriptive power it was interesting to listen to his conversation on the events of long ago. In his youth he was possessed of herculean strength and his industry, thrift and knowledge of his business gained for him the entire confidence and esteem of his employers. About two years ago, owing to failing health, he had to retire from active work and about twelve months ago he entered the Sudbury Hospital and subsequently the General Hospital, where everything that medical skill could do failed to conquer the complaint with which he was afflicted. He bore his sufferings with patience and resignation to the will of God. He made and held friends of all classes for everybody who associated with him quickly learned to trust him on account of his methods of honesty and fairness. He was in entire sympathy with the workman in whatever line of duty he was working. He understood the problems of the workman because he was a worker himself. He had no desire at any time to treat others unfairly, and so was held in the highest respect by organized labour as its well-wisher and friend. When he spoke he was equipped by facts. In a word Tom Wallace was an honest, industrious, and highly respected citizen, and a faithful and competent servant in the enterprising firm of Messrs. Job Brothers, for the long period in which he was employed by them. He was one of the oldest and most prominent members of the Star of the Sea Society, and no man could take greater interest in the working of that institution. In his younger days he was one of the best oarsmen at the Regatta on Quidi Vidi Lake, in which in every case he rowed stroke and was always successful in being first. He rowed in the Native, Iris, Volunteer, and in one particular race in 1875 in which Marmaduke Winter Esq. was coxswain, and Tom Wallace was in his favorite place at the stroke oar, they beat all competitors, amidst the thunderous cheers and great enthusiasm of the thousands on the green at historic Quidi Vidi. The funeral will take place from his brother's residence, corner of Balsam Street and Theatre Hill at 2.30 p.m. on Friday and interment will be at Belvedere, Requiescent in Pace.

Fairbanks Outstunts Self in New Film

AT THE STAR MOVIE MONDAY.

As a matter of fact, according to critics, this whip in the hands of Don Q becomes all that the duelling word was in the hands of the hero in "The Mark of Zorro."

Poultry Show Opened

ATTENDANCE NOT UP TO EXPECTATION.

The annual Poultry Show was officially opened at the C.L.B. Armoury at 8 o'clock last night by His Honor Mayor Cook. There are about 650 head of poultry, 25 pure bred foxes, over twenty Newfoundland dogs and six pens of rabbits on exhibition.

The attendance at the opening was disappointing, considering the excellence of the show and was due in a great measure to so many other attractions. Amongst those present were the Lady Mayoress, "Judge" Warrington, Mr. W. J. Walsh, Minister of Agriculture and Mines, Mr. A. G. Bayly, Secretary of Agriculture and prominent members of the Poultry Association.

President Arch Tait, M.D., in introducing His Worship the Mayor extended to him congratulations on his election to office. He pointed out that during the past 14 years the exhibition had been regularly held excepting the year of 1914 when the war intervened. This year saw as fine a selection of birds as was shown at any previous exhibition, and including the foxes and dogs were estimated to be worth about \$20,000.

Mayor Cook voiced his regret at the unavoidable absence of His Excellency the Governor, spring to court mourning. Commenting on the excellence of the exhibition, he congratulated the members of the Poultry Association for the splendid work they were doing in encouraging the raising of pure bred poultry. It was a surprise to him to hear that the building housed \$30,000 worth of stock, and it was a still greater surprise to him to learn that we import \$200,000 worth of poultry and eggs all of which could be raised in this country. His Worship then declared the show open.

The President in expressing the thanks of the Association to the Mayor and the Minister of Agriculture and Mines for the manner in which he had assisted the Association requested Judge Warrington to express his opinion of the show. The latter said he like very much the manner in which the birds were displayed. Those he had examined showed many qualities that compared favorably with those in the large shows in Canada.

The Minister of Agriculture and Mines being called upon to speak added his congratulations to the Mayor on his recent election to office for the second term. Commenting on the possibilities for the future of poultry raising in Newfoundland, he regretted being unable this year to "arrange" an agricultural exhibition in connection with the Poultry Show. He hoped that with co-operation to make the combined show possible next year.

Mr. George R. Williams, on behalf of the Association extended a hearty welcome to the Lady Mayoress, and introducing Mr. Warrington who comes from Cornwall, Ont., said he had a reputation as a judge which extended from the Pacific to the Atlantic. He had exhibited car loads of birds and had won trophies galore. In referring to the exhibits, Mr. Williams expressed the hope that the breeding of pedigreed dogs would be actively engaged in. There is a large demand for Newfoundland pups at prices ranging from \$75 to \$100 each. He wished both the breeders of dogs and foxes every success in their undertaking and expressed the hope that the exhibition would be largely patronized.

After the formal opening His Worship the Mayor, Mrs. Cook, Judge Warrington, the Minister of Agriculture and other guests were served a light lunch by the ladies of the Spencer Club.

To-night at 7 o'clock the judges of the poultry, foxes and dogs will be seated at the Warrant Officers Mess. There are 110 Leithorns on show and with such a strong show there is great interest in the competition for the cup. The showing of Barred Rocks number 68. These are owned by six exhibitors. Other classes are: White Rocks, 48; Black Minors, 40; White Wyandottes, 26; Rhode Island Reds, 56; Heavy Breeds A.O.V., 60; Speckled Hamburgs, 30. A specially interesting exhibit is a pen of three Bantam Wyandottes owned by Mr. H. M. Winter. The setting birds were imported a short while ago from England.

There is a much stronger showing of Turkeys and Geese than last year. Of the latter there are 87. Two of the 80 Turkeys come from Mannels and weigh about 25 lbs. each. There are 5 or 6 pens of rabbits, in one of which is a brood of young ones. The exhibition of dogs is very creditable. Thirty-four animals have been entered. Two on exhibition last night had their pups, with them. Foxes are shown in the Gymnasium. The exhibits are 8 Silvers owned by Brandon Tilley, Clarendville; 8 Silvers owned by Dr. Campbell; 8 Silvers owned by the N.B. Foxes, Ltd., and 2 Bobs owned by G. Way, Grand Falls. Dr. Bishop is manager of the Falls. Dr. Bishop is also in charge of the exhibits. Three of the animals from his ranch have been taught to do tricks. Their keepers, Messrs. H. Tansley and N. Lovett, were kept busy last night entertaining visitors by showing how domesticated the animals have become.
