The intimate knowledge the mob had displayed of the exact position of all the wealthiest German houses and of valuable German property shows that the riots were organized in ad-

Vienna, Dec. 3.-A report is current, though unconfirmed, that a mob at Prague attacked the soldiers, and a sanguinary encounter ensued. According to this rumor the troops fired the first volley, killing 25 rioters outright and wounding many. Well-dressed men, it is aid, rode on bicycles through the city and the suburbs, making lists of the German places for attack. Goldsmiths' and jewelers' show cases were emptied in a few minutes. Women carried baskets to take home the contents of grocery and provision stores, while to carry were wantonly destroyed. If the troops had not used their swords and bayonets freely Prague might have been burned from end to end. In several cases Jewish shopkeepers escaped crucifix in the shop window. The pillaging was so systematic that in one street alone fifteen Jewish shops were ransacked. An ambulance corps was attacked savagely because the doctors were recognized as German.

Continuation of James Allison's Trial at Berlin.

Evidence as to the Time the Tragedy Took Place-Trevellyan on the Stand.

[Western Press Special to Advertiser.] Berlin, Ont., Dec. 3.-Good progress was made in the Orr murder case to-The crown has fixed the time day. when Allison must have left the Orr's to go to Barrie's farm with the cows at 8:45 or 9 o'clock, and his return at 10, just a few minutes previous to the return of the husband of the murdered woman.

It is shown that Allison told conflicting stories about the gun found hidden in the Orr barn. R. Trevellyan, the so-called "medical student" from Montreal, swore that Mrs. Orr had one time previous to her death loaded the gun for Allison. In the Galt lockup Allison told Trevellyan of having shown Mrs. Orr how to handle the gun on the morning of the murder. Asked about his contradictory stories, Allison replied "I had to say something.' Stalker, the mysterious red-headed

stranger whom Allison led people to believe had committed the murder, proved a complete alibi. Arthur Kinsman, Allison's companion, swore the prisoner said that on the Sunday previous to the murder Allison told him that everybody was intimate with Mrs. Orr, and he would assault her on the first opportunity. Kinsman was committed to jail on Sept. 13; witness spoke to Allison through a hole in the cell wall; Allison denied murdering Mrs. Orr when Kinsman asked if he did it; when reminded of his threat to criminally assault Mrs. Orr, Allison said: "Hush! don't tell

This concluded the crown's The defense moved that no case had been made against the prisoner. The judge ruled differently and the defense proceeded. Their evidence was to show that Allison was not on the Orr farm between 7:30 and 8:30 o'clock, when the murder was done.

THE DEATH CHAIR!

Martin Thorn to be Electrocuted During the Second Week in

January. New York, Dec. 3.-At 10:30 o'clock, Justice Maddox sentenced Martin Thorn to death by electricity Sing Prison, during the week beginning Jan. 10, 1898.

New York, Dec. 3 .- Judge Maddox, in sentencing Martin Thorn, said: "It is needless for me to state anything touching the facts in this case, more than to say that the evidence justifies the verdict. The judgment of the court is that you shall be taken hence from whence you came, and thence to the state prison at Sing Sing within the reasonable time; that there you shall be executed in the form prescribed by law in the week beginning Jan. 10,

Thorn listened to the ominous words without moving a muscle. The prisoner, through his lawyer, then handed up an affidavit to the court applying for an appeal, and stating that he was without funds to employ counsel. In the paper he asked that Mr. Howe be assigned to look after his interests. Justice Maddox took the affidavit and will pass on it later. Thorn was then led to the jail below.

In the aftermath of the trial the details of jury charges contribute a curious element to the costs of this trial. The Garden City Hotel yesterday presented a bill for \$2,049. Of this amount \$816 is for accommodation accorded the first jury, which served until appendicitis forced one of the twelve men to retire. The succeeding jury rolled up an account of \$1,233. Two packs of playing cards are mentioned in the itemized bill, and Queen's county is asked to pay for them. One juror was hard pressed in the game. He borrowed a quarter from the hall boy and forgot to pay it back. The hall boy did not forget it. The quarter is charged in the hotel bill. Of equally absorbing interest is the item of night-shirts. When the jurors entered upon their duties the hotel manager lent shirts to them. There is also an item of \$30 for shaves and hair-cuts. The board of supervisors of Queen's county expect that, with all court expenses, the total cost of the Thorn trial and Mrs. Nack's coming trial will be about \$15,000.
