The Trelley and Railway Crossings.
To the Editor of the ADVERTISER:

I observe that a proposition was made by the new street railway company at the council meeting Monday evening to cross the C. P. R. tracks by means of on overhead bridge on Wellington street. To go two or three blocks out of the proper route and under the C. F. R. by Talbot street would be very inconvenient, especially when rapid transit from the suburbs to the center of the city, direct routes, and a first-class service is what the city requires so much. If a crossing should be made overhead bridge on Wellington street, it would be most advantageous both to the city and the company. The new company would be so near to the new C. P. R. station as the present company is, and would have a direct route on one of the widest streets in the city. The city lost much when it closed Wellington street up, and so far as I know, gained nothing. If a bridge were constructed it would practically open the street again. With Wellington street closed as at present there will be but one entrance to the new station—from Richmond street. Level crossings should be avoided whenever possible. But let me tell you, Mr. Editor, that the crossing on Pall Mall street is very dangerous and not at all necessary. The driver of a car cannot see a train coming up behind, and there is no watchman at the crossing to my knowledge, and shunting is going on in the C. P. R. yards continually. Would not the public be served just as well and more safely if the cars crossed on Richmond street, which is comparatively safe, and the tracks were on Piccadilly street, where the grade is just as good, instead of on Pall Mall? Under these arrangements both the South London and Hamilton road cars would go by the new station. There is plenty of room for improvement, and it is to be hoped that the dangerous and unnecessary crossing on Pall Mall street will be attended to at the proper time.
