PLUNGED OVER NIAGARA.

A Cincinnati Man Makes the Descent
in a Wine Cask

And Lives—He Was Badly Hurt, Though

Buffalo, N. Y., Oct. 25.—The Courier
prints a special dispatch from Niagara
Falls, which, if true, will prove con-
clusively that navigation of the mighty
cataract of Niagara is not only pos-
sible, but has been successfully accom-
plished by one M. Stanley, of
Cincinnati, who, it is alleged, made
the perilous trip over the horseshoe
falls in a barrel at 9:50 o'clock last
night. The barrel was an ordinary wine
cask 5 feet 11 inches in circumference,
which had fitted out for the trip.
A few minutes before 9:50 p.m. Stanley
was launched in the rapids above the
falls in his barrel by his friends who
came here from Cincinnati with him.
The cask bobbed about in the tum-
bling water, and a few seconds later
was whirled over the crest of the cat-
aract into the seething, boiling waters
of the abyss below. Stanley's friends
were in waiting in a small boat be-
low the falls, and anxiously scoured
the waters for the appearance of the
cask, which was discovered in an eddy
soon after the plunge had been made.
It was hastily secured and landed.
Stanley was hauled into the boat,
alive, but apparently badly hurt. The
men rowed to the ferry landing on the
Canadian side, and climbed the road-
way to the boat on the bank.
Their movements seem to have been
lost almost in the darkness, and the
police authorities.

A Meeting Called in Windsor—A Club
to be Formed

Windsor, Oct. 25.—Tonight a meet-
ing of those favoring the independence
of Canada will be held at the office of
Laferty & Davis, Medbury block,
Windsor, for the purpose of forming
an "Independence Club." The
statements made at the meeting em-
body the following: The movement is
now supported by 200 citizens, and
that a membership of over 1,000 is ex-
pected by Dec. 1. It avers that Can-
ada should be a free and untrammelled
republic, and have free trade or un-
restricted reciprocity with the United
States, and should adopt a uniform
customs and excise tariff for both
countries, all of which would be a
great boon for Great Britain, as well as
Canada.

SIR HENRY PARKES WEDS.
Sydney, N.S.W., Oct. 25.—Sir Henry
Parkes, ex-Prime Minister of New
South Wales, was married here today
to Miss Julia Lynch. Sir Henry is 80
years of age.

SALE OF CANADIAN HORSES.
London, Oct. 25.—Seven out of 25
Canadian horses offered for sale at Ald-
ridge's repository today averaged 26
guineas each. Owing to the immense
number of Canadian horses lately im-
ported and placed upon the market,
the demand was weak, and the prices
consequently poor.

MORE ARMENIANS KILLED.
Constantinople, Oct. 25.—Fierce dis-
turbances, accompanied by serious
bloodshed, are reported to have taken
place at Erzingan. Sixty Armenians
are said to have been killed. The Tur-
kish Government has sent a circular
note to the powers announcing that
the outbreak was provoked by the Ar-
menians.

FAMINE IN RUSSIA.
Riga, Russia, Oct. 25.—Famine pre-
vails in the Smolensk and Pskov dis-
tricts of Russia, owing to the failure
of the crops. The Minister of the In-
terior recently sent apart 1,500,000 ro-
ubles for the relief of inhabitants of
these districts, but ragged and hungry
peasants are crowding about the rail-
way stations inquiring what has be-
come of the money.

BALFOUR'S TRIAL BEGUN.
London, Oct. 25.—The trial of Jabez
S. Balfour, formerly a member of Par-
liament and said to be the prime mover
in the manipulation which resulted in
disaster to the Liberator group of
companies, and who was extradited
from the Argentine Republic after
much delay, commenced this morning
in the Queen's Bench Division of the
High Court of Justice.

UPRISING OF CHRISTIANS IMMI-
NENT.
Constantinople, Oct. 25.—The condi-
tion of affairs in the provinces of Alep-
po and Adana inspires grave fears
that an uprising of Christians,
