PLUNGED GYER NIAGARA. A Cincinnati Man Makes the Descent

in a Wine Cask

And Lives—He Was Badly Hurt, Though

Buffalo, N. Y., Oct. 25.—The Courier prints a special dispatch from Niagara Falls, which, if true, will prove con-clusively that navigation of the mighty cataract of Niagara is not only possible, but has been successfully accomplished by one Meredith Stanley, of Cincinnati, who, it is alleged, made the perilous trip over the horseshoe falls in a barrel at 9:50 o'clock last night. The barrel was an ordinary wine cask 5 feet 11 inches in circumference, which he had fitted out for the trip. A few minutes before 9:50 p.m. Stanley was launched in the rapids above the falls in his barrel by his friends who came here from Cincinnati with him. The cask bobbed about in the tumbling waters, and a few seconds later was whirled over the crest of the cataract into the seething, boiling waters of the abyss below. Stanley's friends were in waiting in a small boat below the falls, and anxiously scoured the waters for the appearance of the cask, which was discovered in an eddy soon after the plunge had been made. It was hastily secured and opened, and Stanley was hauled into the boat. alive, but apparently badly hurt. The men rowed to the ferry landing on the Canadian side, and climbed the road-way to the boat on the bank. Here their movements seem to have been lost. The utmost secrecy is being maintained to prevent arrest by the
