TORONTO, Feb. 8.—11 p.m.—The dis-
turbance which was of the Middle Atlantic
coast last night has since developed re-
markable energy, and at the same time has
moved directly northward to the St.
Lawrence Valley. It has caused heavy
gales from the lakes to the Atlantic, to-
gether with a heavy snow fall in the
Ottawa and St. Lawrence Valleys and the
Maritime Provinces.

NORTH AMERICAN LIFE.

As will be seen by the annual report in
another column this leading Canadian com-
pany not only held its own during 1894, but
made very considerable advances in those
most important departments which concern
the policy holder. The new business re-
ceived was over \$3,000,000, being the
largest in the history of the company. Not-
withstanding the procurement of this large
volume of new business, and the payment
to policy holders of death claims, matured
endowments, profits, etc., of the large
sum of \$133,426, it increased its
reserve and surplus funds for policy
holders by about \$284,000. The
report shows evidence of progress, and
financial solidity despite the financial de-
pression that has prevailed throughout all
the countries of the world. From the
comparison made of the financial position
five years ago, and that of today, it ap-
pears, the assets now amount to almost
\$2,000,000, being an increase during the
period referred to of over 143 per cent. A
matter of great interest to the holders of
policies in the company is the large amount
of net surplus accumulated for their ben-
efit, which now figures up over \$338,000,
being an increase of 374 per cent over the
surplus five years ago. The report and the
speeches of those present, especially that
of President Blair, are well worthy of
careful perusal.

poor.

—At 1 o'clock this morning the snow
plow had to go down to Ingersoll to clear
the track for the Pacific express, due here
at 6:30 p.m. last night, and the accommo-
dation from the east due at 9 o'clock.

—Rev. D. M. Mihal, M.A., B.Ph.,
B.Th., of this city, secretary of the Baptist
convention, will exchange pulpits on Sun-
day with Rev. D. Spence, pastor of the
Center Street Baptist Church, St. Thomas.

—At the annual missionary meeting of
St. James' Church, Ingersoll, to be held on
Tuesday evening, Rev. Canon Hill, M.A.,
of St. Thomas, and the Rev. Canon Rich-
ardson, M.A., of this city, will be the
speakers.

—Mr. J. P. Martyn, the Patron Labor
candidate for the Commons, Grand Vic-
e President Currie, Mr. Jabel Robinson, of
St. Thomas, and a speaker from London
will address a public meeting in the Son's
Hall, Union, next Tuesday night.

—The children of the latter Day Saints
Sunday school were treated to a sleigh ride
by Mr. Thos. Maker on Thursday after-
noon. In the evening the Y. P. S. C. E. of
the latter Day Church held a very enjoy-
able social at the residence of Miss
Harrison, Dundas street east. The mem-
bers of the society also enjoyed a sleigh
ride.

—On Monday evening next the second
lecture in aid of the city unemployed will
be given in St. Andrew's Church by the
Rev. S. S. Craig, of Oakville, who takes as
his subject, "Factors in the Determination
of Wages." It is hoped that the church
will be crowded and that the collection to
be taken up will swell the relief fund to a
handsome sum.

—The costs in the Orange-Euphemias
damage suit swell up to about \$1,500. This,
added to the amount of judgment, makes
the total cost to the township of Euphemias
\$7,000. The case was tried at the fall
assizes here a year ago. The plaintiff was
a lady school teacher in Euphemias, and re-
ceived severe injuries by being thrown out
of a rig. The accident was due to a de-
fective roadway.

—At a meeting of the officers and teach-
ers of the Band of Hope held last evening
it was unanimously resolved that the night
of meeting be changed from Thursday to
Tuesday in order to allow the congregation
of Queen's Avenue Methodist Church to
hold their week night prayer meeting in
Somerset Hall on Thursday nights. As the
hall is engaged for Tuesday night, Feb. 12
there will be no meeting of the band until
the evening of Feb. 19.

college and a beautiful autumnal scene in
the Wisconsin woods.

Another Fire.

Fire was discovered yesterday afternoon
in a room in the Baker Block, Dundas
street. It was occupied by a couple of
young people named McDaley. The fire-
men were working on the ruins of the
Queen's Avenue Church and several went
over. They broke into the room and put
the blaze out without much difficulty. The
loss will be \$15 or \$20. Had the fire got
any headway it might have resulted seri-
ously, owing to the gale of wind that was
prevailing at the time. The McDaleys are
brother and sister and both were at work
at the time. The fire is supposed to have
caught from a spark which fell from the
stove.

comparatively easy to obtain relief,

Relief Bureau granted aid to a

ously. Turnips for every meal and no
bread, or meat, or potatoes! Then came
the last meal when the turnips too were
gone, and the Labor Council came to their
aid. Another of the many instances is as
follows: A man had done only four days
work in four months. His wife had lately
been confined and his mother-in-law—
cripple—lived with them. They had no
food and had had none for 24 hours until
the husband took home a basket of eat-
ables from Labor Hall. The series of
lectures that are being advertised are for
the purpose of enabling the members of this
organization to continue this good work.

Boiler and Glass Insurance.
The annual meeting of the Steam Boiler
and Glass Insurance Company of
Canada was held at its offices on Tuesday,
Feb. 5, at 3 o'clock p.m. The directors
submitted the report of the business trans-
acted during the year, which was satisfac-
tory to the shareholders, the business in
both branches showing steady progress.
The company sustained no loss in the
steam boiler branch of its business, which
fact is largely owing to the efficiency of its
staff of trained inspectors, who make
regular periodical inspections of all boilers
insured by the company. The paid-up
capital of the company has been increased
to \$40,100, and its powers enlarged by act
of Parliament. The following gentlemen
now constitute the board of directors,
which has been increased from five to
nine: E. Jones, P.E., Q.C., F.A. Fitz-
gerald, Hon. David Mills, T. H. P. Ham,
Peter Birrswile, John McKee, Samuel
Wright, London; John Morrison, Toronto;
and Fred Stansfield, Montreal. At a

E. Jones, P.E., Q.C., was re-elected presi-
dent, F. A. Fitzgerald vice-president, and
Samuel Wright inspecting director.
