Cheesemen Complain.

Some Members of the London Board Want it Understood

That There Shall be No Selling Off the Board.

The Minority Oppose the Move—Officers Elected—Opening Prices.

London cheese board opened for the season on Saturday afternoon, elected officers, discussed rules, and sold 40 boxes of cheese. Last season's market closed at 8-8 cents, the highest price bid on Saturday was 6-7-8 cents. Belmont factory sold 40 boxes colored at 6-8-8 cents. The bidding commenced at 6-1-2 cents. The cable quotations were 45 shillings 6 pence for white and 41 shillings for colored.

Among those present were: Wm. Aigie, F. D. Norton, E. S. Hunt, Wm. Geary, J. W. Crinklaw, J. W. Cochran, Gourlay, J. Decker, Duncan McMillan, W. F. Odell, G. A. Tuttle, John Frain (Harrington), John Gibson (Fordwich), Harold Eagle (Attercliffe), Harry White (Hawkesville), C. W. Wackling, S. R. Lee, W. S. Sifton, J. W. Wheaton (secretary of the Dairywomen's Association), R. M. Ballantyne and R. Robertson were the only buyers present.

Mr. John Cochran moved that Mr. M. R. Brown (Appin), be president, and Mr. Wm. Geary seconded. Mr. M. R. Brown took a great deal of pleasure in nominating Mr. J. S. Pearce, as president of the board for the coming season.

Mr. Wm. Geary seconded Mr. Pearce's nomination and said that Mr. Pearce had made an admirable president during the past two years. Mr. Pearce stated that he was not anxious to be elected and suggested that the position should go "round."

Mr. Brown was declared elected by a close vote and thanked the board for the honor conferred.

The other officers were elected as follows: First vice-president—Wm. A. Lee, West Nisour; Secretary—J. A. Nelles. Last year's directors were re-elected with two exceptions, James Cochran taking the place of James McMillan, and Duncan McMillan taking the place of Mr. Lee, who becomes vice-president.

Mr. Robertson felt that the business of the year should not be entered on without acknowledging the services of ex-President Pearce, who had, he said, given a good deal of his time, energy and ability to the office. W. H. Odell seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Mr. Pearce responded briefly, acknowledging the compliment in a happy manner.

At the final meeting of last season a committee was appointed to bring in possible amendments to the present rules. Mr. Pearce reported verbally and said that if the present rules were strictly adhered to no further amendments would be necessary.

This report opened the old question of the advisability of retaining the present way of selling by the call system.

"I think," said Mr. Wm. Geary, "that this market was only used last year as a feeder for prices, and I can tell you I have often had a great deal of sympathy for the man who stood up there and called that board off with no bids, or with bids so low that nobody would accept them. I think a great part of the business was done between this hall and the platform of the station, or the Tecumseh House. If you are going to carry that on in this kind of a manner, I would prefer to have a straight open market."

Relieving Insanity.

Wonderful Results of Clever Surgical Operations.

Conducted by Dr. Hobbs at the London Asylum.

Radical Departure From Old Theories With Splendid Results.

Visitors to the Asylum for the Insane will be much struck by the appearance of a tall, raw-built man, a patient, who is generally to be seen operating a lawn mower in the front portion of the grounds. He is a strong man, though spare, and until a few weeks ago was an inmate of the infirmary, or north ward, of the asylum. Today he is trusted in any portion of the grounds, and is in his right mind again after five years of torture. This man's case is only one of a great many remarkable recoveries which have occurred at the Asylum during the last year or so, as a result of clever surgical operations conducted by Dr. A. T. Hobbs, and the several local physicians who have from time to time assisted in these operations.

Miss Graydon, the clever and obliging president of the club, was re-elected by acclamation by a standing vote, and amid much applause.

Miss Graydon afterwards made an address, in which she gracefully acknowledged the compliment paid to her. She also referred to the excellent work of the club's finances, and briefly reviewed the work of the past season and spoke hopefully of the future.

An Ancient Contract.

Among the old written contracts of the time of Abraham among the Chaldeans is one which shows that a laborer whose name was Sumirizibim hired himself to Rammon-bani for three months' labor, for one and a half shekels of silver, 82 cents our money, for the whole three months, worth now 42 cents of our money, if weighed as it was then. Besides this silver he was to have three measures of meal, of 2-3-4 bushels, and a half quail of oil, about two gallons. Another laborer, Ijudum, worked still cheaper. He hired to Nur-Kimmun, for one year, for four and a half shekels of silver, of 2-4-9. There is nothing said about board and lodgings—doubtless, however, it was furnished by the employer. They were well fed, as is shown by their capacity for labor or war. The old tablets show that women were on an equality with men in property rights and in civil affairs; a fact which Solomon brings out vividly in his description of the Virtuous Woman.

Appeal for Armenia.

Issued to the Charitable People of London.

Collections Asked For—Need of Help Emphasized.

To the Editor of the "Advertiser":

Dear Sir,—Will you allow me, as representing the Women's Council of London, to say a few words about the need of Armenia, and to ask the women of London and the vicinity for their help.

While it is quite true that through the various channels offered, churches, societies and individuals have given largely and generously, there is still great need for more assistance. Hundreds and thousands of destitute people in that unhappy country are looking longingly to civilized nations for practical help.

The Review of Reviews for April gave an interesting account of the manner in which the funds were applied. Bakeries were instituted which gave out 3,750 loaves a day to 500 families. Clothing was also made by women for the poor, and 200 sewed garments given out every day. Miss Grace Kimball is in charge of the distribution of these goods. Further information may be had through the pamphlets and slips issued by the Armenia Information Bureau, 3 Arundel street, Strand, London, England, where Rev. Canon Scott Mollard receives subscriptions and gives information. It has been suggested that an appeal should be made to the women of this free, happy, protected country in behalf of those noble women of Armenia, who are not only dying, but undergoing tortures of mind and body too terrible for repetition, rather than abjure Christ and embrace the Moslem religion.

In order that every one might give something, it has been decided to ask only 10 cents from each person. The Women's Council of Halifax has contributed £300 in a similar way, the contributions ranging from 5 cents to £200. We ask women of every creed, race and party to help in this effort for the sake of God and one common womanhood. Let us remember the golden rule, and exert ourselves in this matter. Exertion is all we need. People are willing to give if some one asks them, and such a small sum will not be a heavy drain on any one's purse. We ask that every phase of women's work and life should interest itself in asking for this amount. Could not 5 cents subscription be taken up in societies of all sorts—shops, factories, schools, as well as among people of leisure? Ladies in small towns and villages will perhaps interest themselves in this movement and help us too. London women have kind hearts, which must often have been touched by the oft-told tale of Armenian sufferings. Will they not now let those sympathetic thoughts blossom into further acts of beneficence, when they contrast their own safety with the sorrow of these heroic sisters? By and by, when these matters have fallen into a right perspective, we shall be very sorry if we have not each done our part in helping those in such dire distress.

This letter cannot be better closed than by an extract from a letter written to Englishwomen by a young Armenian lady whose sufferings cannot be told. "The love of God, the love of our people, and the love of our mothers, wives, sisters and daughters, help us, Christian sisters, before it is too late, and take the thanks of the mothers, wives, sisters and daughters of my people, and with them the gratitude of one for whom, in spite of her youth, death would come with happy release. (Signed) Lucine Mussegh."
