

There was a lengthy battle last evening at the council meeting over the proposed investigation into the several departments of the city hall. Ald. Saunders fought to keep the city engineer's department under the control of the board of works.

Ald. Morgan brought the question up. He moved that an investigation be conducted into the city hall by the chairmen of the three committees Ald. Richter, Ald. Tancock and Ald. Ashplant.

"I have no idea of a clean sweep," said Ald. Morgan. "I desire to know whether or not any improvements can be suggested, or better work secured. I am convinced that we have a fine staff of officials, but such an investigation would produce much good, and would satisfy the public." Ald, Tancock seconded the motion.

Each to Investigate. "Ald. Morgan is anticipating the action of No. 1 committee," said Ald Richter. "We are going to go through the departments under our charge, and be one of the cases. discover for ourselves what improvements are necessary. We intended adding the chairmen of the different committes also, to assist us.' "Has No. 1 committee power to make a thorough investigation?" asked Ald.

Mayor Beattie read the bylaws governing the duties of No. 1 committee, in which it was stated that the city officials should be under control of No. 1 committee, but that the engineer's department was under the control of the oard of works.
