

\$100,000 FOR THE GREAT CONGRESS

Montreal Public Has Subscribed Big Sum for Eucharistic Meeting.

A GATHERING OF NOBLES

Dignitaries of the Catholic Church the World Over Will Be Present—The Programme Outlined.

Montreal, Aug. 25.—The twentieth Eucharistic Congress, to be opened next month at Montreal, will excel all its predecessors in wealth of religious coloring and ritual solemnity. This result will be the outcome of the effort of those interested whose object it is to make the congress the greatest religious demonstration ever held.

From a numerical point of view the congress will present a stupendous aspect. It is anticipated that it will attract no less than fifty thousand people from all parts of the country. Another feature of the congress about to be held is that it will be of a purely devotional character. No church problems will be discussed and nothing in the nature of political business will be entertained.

Gathering of Dignitaries.

It will be the gathering of clerical dignitaries and distinguished laymen. In the centre of the proceedings will be Cardinal Yvonnelli, the Pope's legate, and supporting him will be the Cardinal of Montreal, the Archbishop of Lyons, the Archbishop of Bourne of Westminster, London, England. Among the notable laymen expected to take a prominent part in the proceedings of the congress are the Duke of Norfolk, the Duc de Cars, General Maysonnet and Count Henri d'Yvonneville. The name of Mr. John Redmond, leader of the Irish party in the British House of Commons, is also mentioned as a probable attendant.

In addition to Cardinal Gibbons the following distinguished clergymen will be present: Archbishop O'Connell of Boston, and Archbishop Glennon of St. Louis; Bishop McGovern of Montreal; Monsignor Paquette of Quebec; Rev. J. J. McCoy, Worcester; Father Finn; Right Rev. Mgr. Lynch, Utica; Rev. A. Thompson, Glace Bay, N.S.; Father Hartigan, and Rev. Thomas Campbell.

Archbishop O'Connell.

Archbishop O'Connell has been chosen to preach the opening sermon on Fletcher's Field, an imposing altar is now being erected. Though still a comparatively young man, the archbishop is one of the leading prelates of the United States. During the congress he is to be the guest of Mayor Guerin, who is having a new private chapel added to his dwelling for the congress.

Another prelate known in the larger field of the States is Archbishop Glennon, who will preach at the Pontifical High Mass, to be celebrated in St. Patrick's Church on Saturday, the 10th September.

Impending Services.

Among the other impending services of the congress will be one especially reserved for men, held on Sunday afternoon, Sept. 11, in the Monument National, it is recognized that the majority of the delegates will be unable to hear the distinguished orators at the meetings in Notre Dame. An effort is being made to have the majority of retail stores and business places closed on that afternoon. The meeting will be addressed by the papal legate.

At the various ceremonies in connection with the congress a number of eminent clergymen will read papers. They include representatives from the old land and from various places in the United States and Canada.

The procession through the city on Sept. 10 will mark the climax of the impressive scenes that Montrealers will have an opportunity to witness. The route of the procession is three and a half miles long, and will be found no exaggeration to state that at the least 300,000 people will participate in it. In preparation for the event the city is now proceeding on a lavish scale to make the spectacle as picturesque and impressive as possible.

On Sunday morning, Sept. 11, Cardinal Gibbons will preach in St. James' Cathedral, which at the present moment is undergoing suitable decoration and illumination.

Montreal's Response.

To insure the success of the congress nearly \$100,000 have already been subscribed by the Montreal public to cover the barest expenses of reception, decorations, and entertainment. The cost of decorations and other arrangements already completed has mounted up to \$65,000, and much more will have to be spent between now and Sept. 6. It is even calculated that all the expenses of clerical organizations, public bodies and private individuals are taken into consideration, from \$800,000 to a million dollars will have been spent in the city in connection with the congress.

The programme of the conferences for the congress is a skillful arrangement of eucharistic topics, comprehending a multiplicity of themes, the Blessed Eucharist in all its various phases and effects—the Sacrament of the Christian Catholic cult.

MR. ANSON WALLACE DIES OF INJURIES

Richmond St. Man Succumbed to Hurts Received in Auto Accident.

Mr. Anson Wallace, of 217 Richmond street, who was injured in an auto accident on Horton street on Saturday at noon, died in Victoria Hospital this morning at 1:15, without ever fully recovering consciousness.

Mr. Wallace recovered partial consciousness at short intervals yesterday morning, and it was thought that he was improving. Yesterday afternoon, however, he grew worse, and continued to sink throughout the evening. The injuries sustained by Mr. Wallace were of an internal nature, it is believed, and the attending physicians could find nothing to cause the prolonged unconsciousness from which he suffered.

Mr. Wallace was 63 years old, and came to London from Fingal twelve years ago. He was employed at George White's. Besides his wife, he leaves one son, Charles, of Yorkton, Sask.; Mr. Wm. Wallace, of Cardinal, Ont., is a brother. The funeral arrangements have not yet been completed.

THREE TIMES AND OUT

Owen Sound Hotelkeeper Sent to Jail For Breaking License Law.

Owen Sound, Aug. 25.—Andrew Fogarty, proprietor of the Albion Hotel, has been sentenced to four months in jail by Magistrate Creaser for selling liquor in a local option locality. He was not in court, and a warrant was issued for his arrest.

Mr. Fogarty was found guilty on a similar charge two years ago, and also in 1908, so a fine could not be imposed in this case.

Two witnesses swore that Fogarty sold them something that, if not whiskey, at least had whiskey in it. One witness said he had not asked for anything in particular, but merely asked Fogarty if he "had anything." The other "guessed it was whiskey," however.

HARD BATTLE FOR ORPHANS

"They will have all the fight they want," replied Mr. Roosevelt. "I am only going to the convention because the interests of the people of New York demand that the Republican party, given a chance to stand squarely and uncompromisingly for clean, decent, honest politics."

ACCIDENT OF ROCKLIFE

Rifle Burst in the Hands of One of the Sharpshooters.

Ottawa, Aug. 24.—Lieut. Semple, of the Seventy-eighth Regiment, had a dangerous experience at the D. R. A. matches, when the muzzle of his rifle was split into three sections as he discharged a shot. It was a long Ross rifle, and while the discharge did not cause any unusual kick, the report was dull, rather than the usual sharp crack. The muzzle was split back to the band which fastens on the foresight. There were three splits at equal distance apart, and the mouth of the gun was opened up as evenly as if done by machinery.

It is thought to have been due to sand getting into the mouth of the rifle.

WOMEN LEAD STRIKE RIOT

Miners Assailed With Bricks, Stones, Sticks and Mud.

Scranton, Pa., Aug. 25.—Women led in the assault on men who persisted in going to work at the Old Forge collieries of the Pennsylvania Coal Company, where a strike is in progress. When the line of men who have continued at work neared the breaker the women pushed themselves to the fore, and saluted the workmen with a shower of bricks, sticks, stones and mud. One stone struck a Polish miner on the nose, covering his face with blood.

Deputy Sheriff P. V. Scanlon and Matthew Coughlin were sent to the vicinity, and they ran to the rescue of the workmen, who did not appear to know how to defend themselves from the women.

STALLINGS SENDS PITCHER MANNING TO THE HUTSLERS.

New York, Aug. 24.—The New York Americans tonight released Pitcher Walter Manning to the Rochester Eastern League Club. Manning was once before this season turned over to Rochester, but never joined the club, as Manager Stallings decided to give him another chance.

FIRE AT HUNTSVILLE.

Huntsville, Aug. 24.—The Huntsville Engine Works Company's plant was destroyed by fire last night. The loss is \$1,500, including \$500 worth of valuable patterns. The loss is covered by insurance.

RATES FOR MEALS WILL BE ADVANCED

W. C. T. U. Compelled to Raise Owing to the Cost of Provisions.

After an interval for rest during the hot weather, the Women's Christian Temperance Union resumed its meetings on Tuesday, Aug. 23, in the lecture hall of the Public Library, with Mrs. Hubert Aschmitt, its president, in the chair.

Mrs. McElmont, of Ottawa, a prominent White Ribboner, much interested in the work at fairs, was introduced by Mrs. (Dr.) Weekes. She spoke a few pertinent words during the discussion of the rate per meal to be charged at the W. C. T. U. dining hall on the Western Fair grounds. A number of members considered that as provisions are so dear it would be wise to raise the fare to 35 and 40 cents. After discussion it was resolved to ask 30 and 40 cents. An extra meeting is to be called the first Tuesday in September, in order to inform the union concerning the final arrangements of the committee appointed to look after fair work.

'PINOS ASKING FOR INDEPENDENCE

Deputation of Moro Chiefs Offer Allegiance to the United States.

Zamboanga, Mindanao, P. I., Aug. 24.—A demonstration in favor of the annexation of Mindanao to the United States occurred today. Two hundred Filipinos had presented to Secretary of War Dickinson, who is now visiting the Philippine Islands, a petition asking that the Moro Islands be placed under Filipino control and the entire archipelago granted independence.

Secretary Dickinson in reply said that the American Government was not willing to intrust the Government of 335,000 Moros to 66,000 Filipinos living in widely-scattered regions. He feared that such a solution of the Philippine question would lead to a rupture of peaceful conditions, when to the Americans would be left the task of restoring order.

Four Dattos or Moro chiefs, representing 40,000 Moros at this point dramatically tendered their allegiance to the United States and announced that they would fight if the Americans withdrew.

A wild demonstration followed and the cry that the province must become an American territory ran through the crowd.

SLICED OFF HIS EAR

Woman's Way of Punishing Her Too Talkative Husband.

New York, Aug. 25.—Because her husband talked too much, as she put it, Mrs. Martin Cool sliced off his right ear today with a razor.

"Yes, I cut off his ear, and I'm glad of it," said the woman when arrested. "He talked too much and that annoyed me."

THE WINNIPEG LOCKOUT

No Settlement of the Trouble in the Building Trades.

Winnipeg, Aug. 24.—The lockout of masons and bricklayers by contractors, connected with the Builders' Exchange continues, with no particular change, opposing parties having had no conferences since Monday.

Peter Lyall, sen., of Montreal, reached Winnipeg today, but declares that the labor trouble has nothing to do with his westward trip. In an interview he stated that the trouble, which originated with his Montreal firm, is solely due to his refusing absolutely to recognize the international dictating to Canadian workmen.

BUYS A COFFIN DIES BY GAS

Had Only Six Cents Left of \$200,000 Fortune.

Des Moines, Iowa, Aug. 25.—After carefully planning all the details of his burial, including the selection of a coffin, John R. Morrison, at one time a wealthy real estate man, committed suicide in his office in the Youngerman block by inhaling gas.

For more than two weeks he had discussed with his friends his approaching death. No credence was placed in his threats. Ten days ago he went to an undertaking establishment and selected a coffin, which he explained was for his friend. He paid for it, explaining that he would first for it in a few hours. Tonight a letter was found requesting that he be buried in this coffin.

Mr. Morrison had been despondent ever since he announced that he would divorce four years ago. He had but six cents left of a fortune estimated at \$200,000. Saturday night he called in a lawyer, and added a codicil to his will, in which he bequeathed a life insurance policy for \$2,000 to his son Chester. His erstwhile wife, a son and a daughter, reside in Seattle.

DEATH OF EX-CHIEF.

Newark, N. J., Aug. 25.—William Brown Glasby, chief of police of Newark from 1868 until 1872, who served as bodyguard for Abraham Lincoln on the trip from New York to Washington when Lincoln took his first oath of office, is dead, at his home here. He was 81 years old.

COLD WAVE HITS CHAMPAGNE CROP

Cellars Have Stock to Cover From Three to Five Years.

Paris, Aug. 24.—The cold, wet weather, which has spoiled the wine harvest generally, was especially disastrous in the champagne district. For the fourth year in succession the champagne harvest has failed to cover the growers' expenses. The 1907 crop was exceedingly indifferent, and in 1908 and 1909 it was insignificant. The normal yield for the 135,000 hectares constituting the champagne district, as delimited in 1908, is 300,000 hectolitres. It will not reach 50,000 hectolitres this year.

The average yield ought to be over 20 hectolitres a hectare. This year the average is two hectolitres. Five hundred hectares, which have been most favored, will yield six hectolitres. The district averages one hectolitre a hectare. The Eparnay district yields less than two hectolitres a hectare.

The Rheims Chamber of Commerce's statistics show there is sufficient stock in the cellars to cover five years' complete failure of the harvest, but dealers say that this includes all wines, some of which are unsuitable for making champagne. They place the stock at three years' supply.

The growers are facing a desperate situation. It is estimated that 40,000,000 francs are needed to set the district in shape to continue champagne producing properly. The growers are appealing to the Government to provide them with the means to borrow this money on easy terms.

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TWO POPULAR AND ABLE MEN

General Conference Chooses Dr. Carman and Dr. Chown Superintendents.

AN IMPRESSIVE SESSION

Proposal to Divide the Toronto Conference Voted Down—Tribute to Clifford Sifton.

Victoria, B. C., Aug. 24.—This morning's session of the general conference of the Methodist Church was most impressive. Before the vote for general superintendents was taken it was decided that one should reside west of Ontario, but that no limits should be placed on his jurisdiction. It was also arranged that a superintendent to act for eight years be chosen first, then another for four years. On the first ballot 284 votes were cast. Rev. Dr. Carman received 173 and was declared elected. The next highest was Rev. Dr. S. D. Chown, also of Toronto, with 67 votes.

The result was greeted with hearty and prolonged applause, the whole conference rising to greet the venerable general superintendent when he responded. Dr. Carman said he was overwhelmed by this expression of confidence. He had declined to take the decision of the conference as the will of Providence, he appreciated the verdict, and would go forward in the love and fear of God most gratefully and unflinchingly.

The conference then proceeded to elect a second superintendent for a four-year term. Of the 238 ballots cast, Rev. Dr. S. D. Chown received 217. When the result was announced he took the platform amid great enthusiasm, and made a brief and appropriate speech.

Other Officers Elected.

Rev. James Allen was elected general secretary of the home mission department, and Rev. T. E. Shore, M. A., B. D., was chosen to succeed the late Dr. Sutherland as secretary of the foreign missions. He received 230 votes out of 233 cast on the first ballot. Dr. J. W. Graham had practically no competition for the secretaryship of the educational department. Every ballot but six being marked for him. Mr. N. W. Rowell, K. C., moved that as an expression of appreciation of the services of the home mission secretary, the home mission society, Mr. H. H. Fudger, the secretary be instructed to cast a ballot for his re-election. This was heartily agreed to.

For the annual general secretary of the department, 279 ballots were cast. The Rev. T. Albert Moore, D. D., was elected on the first ballot, receiving 167 votes, and the Rev. J. A. Oliver, D. D., received 112. Dr. Moore addressed the conference, expressing his regret at severing his connection with the Lord's Day Alliance, to which he had been a member since its formation. He was always willing to obey the call of the Church, and Dr. Wm. Briggs was re-elected church steward. Dr. W. B. Creighton, editor of The Christian Guardian, Dr. N. E. Johnson, editor of The Westerner, Dr. A. C. Crews, editor of The Sunday school publications, and the Rev. S. T. Bartlett, general secretary of Sunday schools and Epworth Leagues, each by almost unanimous vote.

Aid for Sufferers.

While the ballots were being counted during the forenoon session several reports of committees were considered. It was decided to disburse the balance from the Union Church Relief Fund by giving \$1,500 to Campbell, N. B., Methodist Church, and \$500 to Phoenix B. E. Church, both of which had suffered by fire.

The committee on conference boundaries brought in a report which suggested that the Toronto conference do what was suggested by the Toronto conference into two settings, one to Toronto east and Uxbridge districts to be attached to the present Bay of Quinte conference, the whole to be known as the Toronto east conference.

President Dr. Hincks, of the Toronto conference, and others opposed this suggestion, on the ground that it would be a great injury to Toronto, and he separated into two sections. The interests of Methodism in the city, he contended, demanded unity of administration. The proposal was voted down.

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
