

Industrial accidents, occurring to 173 individual work people in Canada during the month of May, 1911, were reported to the department of labor. Of these 52 were fatal, and 121 resulted in serious injuries.

The number of trade disputes reported to have been in existence in Canada during May was 34, an increase of 20 compared with May, 1910. About 212 firms and 13,007 employees were involved in these disputes, 189 firms and 4,038 employees having been involved in new disputes.

mately 299,400 working days, com-pared with a loss of 202,275 days in April, and 71,830 days in May, 1910 The principal disputes are in the coal lelds of the West, and the carpenters strike at Vancouver.
