

Assize Court Occupied By Hearing Action .For Recovering Price of 700 Bushels of Bean's. Progress was made in the assize court

Ottawa, April 22.-Corn binders are reduced in duty to 121/2 per cent. This announcement has been officially made to the chief Liberal whip, Mr. Pardee In this decision by the Government there is a victory for Mr. Archie McCoig. the Liberal representative, of West Kent. Corn binders are very largely used by the farmers of the western peninsula of Ontario and Mr. McCoig believes that the farmers of his district should be able to buy their tools as cheaply as possible. When Finance Minister White anounced in his budget that mowers and binders were to be reduced from 171/2 to 121/2 per cent Mr. McCoig instantly asked if binders included corn binders.

Finance Minister White said that he did not know but prompted by Mr. Meighan from behind said "Yes," but in such a doubting way that the House did not know whether the announcement would stand.

It is understood that since the budget the question of duty rate on corn binders Mr. McCoig was determined to hold the Government to its admission and gave them to understand that he would do so. Now after consideration for more than a week the Government announces that corn binders go with wheat binders at the lower rate of customs charge.
