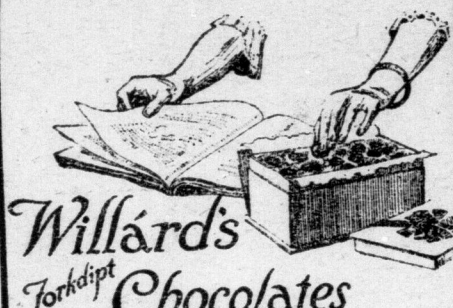

BOARD SELECTS HEATING ENGINEER

Despite Opposition, H. P. Elliott Is Installed as Ventilation Expert

WANTS DIVISION OF WORK

Trustee Silverwood Suggests That Heating and Ventilation Be Separated.

Despite the opposition of a strong delegation from the Builders' Exchange, H. P. Elliott was appointed heating and ventilation engineer in connection with the construction of the new Grand Avenue School by a vote of 6 to 4 at the meeting of the board of education yesterday afternoon. E. H. Russell read an address, the object of which, it was stated, was to encourage the improvement of the architecture and natural beauty of the city, the retention of city business for citizens, first, last and all the time, the following of the principle of competition in awarding contracts and the encouragement of home industries by purchasing supplies and materials wherever possible from local firms and manufacturers. The communication was signed by P. S. Russell, secretary, and President T. R. Wright, William Skelly and other leading contractors, builders and plumbers composed the delegation. Mr. Russell expressed the fear that the consulting engineer would eventually become a managing engineer.

Alleged "Buckling." Architect Watt of the firm of Watt & Blackwell, who prepared plans for the new school, expressed the opinion that Mr. Elliott could secure heating equipments in the open market at rates less than the dealers. One of the members of the Builders' Exchange had somehow got the idea that Watt & Blackwell were "buckling" his firm, according to Mr. Watt. Trustee A. E. Silverwood thought it well to have an independent man to look after heating and ventilating equipments. It was whispered outside the Builders' Exchange that the board was paying two

prices and if so, the citizens' interests must be looked after. Dr. R. W. Shaw objected to two commissions being paid on the work, one of 5 per cent. to the architect and another of 2 per cent. to the heating engineer. Dr. Feasdale ridiculed the wasting of hours of discussion on the question of heating engineer, the question of an eight-roomed school, E. P. Dennis moved to refer it back to No. 2 committee with power. Trustee W. G. Young thought the principle worth trying out. If it worked well with a small school it could be tried to advantage in building a larger school. If not, it need not be tried again. Trustee Thomas Rowe objected to employing a heating expert on an eight-room school. Trustee W. W. Gammage cited an instance of a local firm saving \$10,000 by employing a heating expert.

"If I have a suspicion that we are paying too much, and there is such a suspicion," said Trustee John M. Gunn, "I am going to vote for the employment of a heating engineer. In the present case the cost will only amount to about \$200."

To Start at Once

The board decided to go ahead at once and call for tenders for the Collegiate Institute alterations and addition, with the exception of the heating system, which will be given further consideration. The Princess avenue additions and new heating system, the new Grand Avenue School and the new Charlotte Street School will also be gone ahead with at once.

BAD BEANS!

Assize Court Occupied By Hearing Action For Recovering Price of 700 Bushels of Beans.

Progress was made in the assize court yesterday in the suit brought by R. J. Petch of Wardsville, against William C. Newman and Marietta Newman, of Ridgeway, to recover \$6,288.10, which the plaintiff alleges is due him on unpaid accounts and commissions on the purchase of beans for them under the firm name of Newman & Co.

Mr. Petch took the stand and explained his operations as buyer for the defendant company during three seasons. The case is a very complicated one. The defendant deposes that Mr. Petch shipped against their instructions, rotten and unsaleable beans, some seven hundred bushels of which they had to dispose of and bury by order of the board of health of Ridgeway. They claim that all beans that were up to standard were paid for, and enter a counter-claim for \$618.03, which includes an item of \$40 storage on the alleged worthless beans.

DUTY ON CORN BINDERS CUT TO 12-1-2 PER CENT.

Big Victory for Liberal Member for West Kent—Caused Serious Dispute.

Ottawa, April 22.—Corn binders are reduced in duty to 12½ per cent. This announcement has been officially made to the chief Liberal whip, Mr. Pardee.

In this decision by the Government there is a victory for Mr. Archie McCoig, the Liberal representative, of West Kent.

When Finance Minister White announced in his budget that binders and mowers were to be reduced from 17½ to 12½ per cent Mr. McCoig instantly asked if binders included corn binders.

It is understood that since the budget the question of duty rate on corn binders has been the subject of serious dispute. Mr. McCoig was determined to hold the Government to its admission and gave them to understand that he would do so.

Now after consideration for more than a week the Government announces that corn binders go with wheat binders at the lower rate of customs charge.

ST. THOMAS GETS 16 LIQUOR LICENSES

LADY MACDONALD DEAD

Succumbs at Victoria After Several Months' Illness.

Victoria, B. C., April 22.—Mrs. Catharine Balfour Macdonald, widow of Sir J. A. Macdonald, died today after an illness extending over several months.

The late Mrs. Macdonald was the daughter of Captain James Murray Reid, who played to this part one of the first Hudson Bay Company's sailing ships, the Vancouver. She married Senator Macdonald in March, 1857, and has since resided in Victoria.

CHECK FOR \$2,000 FOR SIR JAMES WHITNEY
