

Impure Milk.

Public interest still continues to cenre around the deliberations of this ection, which is under the chairman nip of Dr. Helen McMurchy. At this norning's session a most interesting paper on "The Control of the Municipal Milk Supply" by Dr. G. G. Naismit f Toronto.

As milk is the only uncooked anima ood we eat, it was most important that should be properly handled, particlarly in the hot weather. The diffiulty in the larger cities, such as Toonto, was much greater than in cities there the supply was gathered within radius of ten miles or so. In the arger cities the milk was shipped in rains, and was frequently a day old efore it reached the consumer. he temperature of the milk was owed to rise during this time, multiolication of bacteria immediately began, and the milk was quickly made unfit for consumption.

Should Be Pasteurized. The only way of rendering it absolutely safe was to pasteurize it, and he strongly advocated the adoption of methods in handling a city's milk sup-ply which would lead to a preference being given to milk which had been

Firemen Expect to Find Many More in Buffalo Mill.

SIXTY INJURED MANY FATALLY

Parties Worked All Night to Rescue Victims of the Explosion.

Buffalo, June 25 .- An official checker ing of the list of employees of the sion yesterday, shows that in addition to the 11 unknown victims, 26 men are still unaccounted for and are believed to be in the ruins.

Buffalo, June 25 .- Three bodies were dug out of the smoldering ruins of the Huested Milling Company elevator today, two more are visible in the debris, two of the victims succumbed to the injuries, bringing the total of dead from the explosion and fire up to 11. The podies recovered today were so badly charred that identification was impos-

From the upper windows of the concrete section of the elevator and from the Elk street viaduct the bodies are plainly visible, and crowds are watching the firemen creep-ing steadily towards them. Great clouds of smoke from the burning ruins below make the recovery of the bodies difficult. Just how many bodies are in the supola neither the police nor the firemen are able to say with certainty

Fled From Flames. Two bodies can be seen stretched out. cross the floor of one of the balconies. No men were at work in the cupola, and t is believed those whose bodies are now sight fled to the tower following the explosion and the flames overwhelmed

Careful checking up of the employees ime cards has accounted either in dead, njured in hospitals, or slightly injured, and at home, of all but eight men. These men are believed to have been caught in the upper portions of the elevator and cut off from escape.

Firemen poured streams of water on he ruins all night, and this morning but the debris is piled so high that it will be days before it can be cleaned and complete search made. This and the nature of the injuries of the victims, no ultimate hope of recovery, make any estimate of the number of explosions victims mere speculation.

HEAVY LOSS OF LIFE IN C.P.R. WRECK NEAR OTTAWA

Ottawa, June 25 .- The Canadian Pacific Western Express, leaving here shortly before 2 o'clock this afternoon, heavily laden with immigrants, was derailed three miles west of Ottawa with heavy loss of life.

Up to 2:30 o'clock it is reported eight bodies have been taken from the wreckage.

Four cars shot down an embankment into the Ottawa River, and two coaches were wrecked on the track. The accident was caused by a spread rail.
