Poticerek, governor of Bosnia; Field Marshal von Broevic and Count von Berchtold, former Austrian foreign minister

# GERMANY'S GENERALS REFUSE TO RECOGNIZE

ANY FOREIGN COURT Berlin, Feb. 9.- A secret meeting of army and navy leaders a month ago in anticipation of a demand for extradition, compiled a set of regulations for common action. These instructions, which are signed by Gens. Von Heeringen, Von Kluck and Falkenhayn, as well as others, declare that it is no violation of honor for one to place himself outside the pale of seizure by his own government. Therefore they must refuse to surrender, refuse to recognize the legality of a foreign court, and do nothing in the shape of personal diffence, or otherwise acknowledge such court, but make the following declaration in the German language

"I have merely done by duty as a German soldier. As such I refuse to recognize a foreign court, and also decline to make any further statement."

**U. S. SUGGESTION OPPOSED**

Paris, Feb. 9.—Consideration of the general European financial situation, as reflected in the exchange, resulted in the adoption Saturday by the supreme economic council of a resolution advocating a conference of competent ministers of France, Great Britain, Italy and Belgium to consider possible measures for relief.

Financial writers devote little space to the sentimental aspects of the situation that figured largely in earlier discussions, but recognize that adoption of heavy taxation, stringent economy and reduction of imports by France must be awaited before these several conventional methods of bettering the exchange situation can be applied. 

Former Food Controller An-WILSON APPROVES RESERVATIONS MADE

New York, Feb. 3.—Herbert Hoover last night issued a statement defining shis attitude toward the presidency.

He announced that he is not a candidate for the nomination, and that no one is authorized to speak for him politically. If the League of Nations is made an issue in the election, he says he will vote for the party that stands for the league. In response to requests that he declare allegiance to either one or the other of the great political parties, Mr. Hoover says he will wait until it more definitely appears what the party managers stand for, and will "exercise a pregogative of American citizenship, and decline to pledge my vote blindfold." Washington, Feb. 7.—President Wilson has written Senator Hitchcock, the Democratic leader, approving the reservations to the Treaty of Versailles which the senator presented to the bipartisan conference committees which recently falled to reach an agreement. The letter was written before the publication of Viscount Grey's letter stating that the Lodge reservations were acceptable to Great Britain.

BRITISH MARINES HAVE LANDED AT PANDERMA

Constantinople, Saturday, Feb. 7.—
(By the Associated Press.)—British marines have landed at Panderma, the northern terminus of the railway to Smyrna. This action was taken because of the recent capture by the Turks of a Turkish arms depot at Akhbar, near Chenek, on the Dardanelles. Small detachments of the British are on guard. Thus far there have been no casualties.
