

Scientists declare the present generation has not yet had an opportunity observing glaciers in a period such as now is occurring. One of the best known Swiss glaciers, the Grindelwald glacier, in the Bernese Oberland, is actually advancing at the rate of twelve inches a day, and Grindelwald is at present the headquarters of a commission of scientists studying this remarksion of scientists studying this remark-able phenomena. Many a tree and many a barn standing in the path of the glacier already has been swept away and it is not surprising, therefore, that natives in the districts nearest these glaciers are viewing their daily advance

with anxiety. Advance is Puzzle. While it is admitted generally that alternate advances and retreats of the glaciers are directly connected with the mperature prevailing during the sea-ns, when cold and rainy spells would cause an advance and hot spells a re-cession, scientists nevertheless are somewhat puzzled why the Swiss glacier should advance so rapidly at present as the snowfall during the past winter, for instance, was considerably below


