Mrs. Wall read an interesting paper on the subject of children's literature, which was much appreciated. Since first mentioned date there has been inaugurated the Kingston street school, the Hillside school and the Rock school, the thillside school and the Rock Bay school, having a present enrolment of 3,121, but as will be seen by the sub-joined report, the attendance at the North Ward school five years ago was 34 more than at the present time. This will show to what a degree that school was overcrowded at the time mentioned was overcrowded at the time mentioned.
