He thought that some did not realize the responsibility which was imposed on them and had been prone to give permission to all and sundry with the result that the object of the restriction, namely, to protect property and possibly life, was nullified. That having been the experience through the enactment of a somewhat moderate measure he had come to the conclusion that one hard and fast rule would sion that one hard and fast rule would have to be adopted which would give only those with real estate holdings in the district the privilege of using finearms.

This stand was endorsed by the other councillors.
