Mr. McCarthy's Carriers by Land Bill-Centrifugal Butter-Making. OTTAWA, March 18 .- A meeting of the ommittee on railways and canals was held this forenoon. An act to incorporate the Fredericton and St. Mary's railway and bridge company was reported. An act to amend the act to incorporate the South Saskatchewan Valley railway company was slav reported. This bill provider for the all and the second state of also reported. This bill provides for the also reported. This bill provides for the building of a road from Regins, on the Canadian Pacific, to a point near Prince Albert. Mr. McCarthy's bill, intituled "carriers by land," was next proceeded with. Mr. Abbott held that the act was unconstitutional, in so far as they had a law in Quebec for carrying goods which was quite contrary to the one in question. Mr. Davies did not see why there could not be a general law for partiers over all the provinces, and if Quebec desired she could have her own law in operation within her own province. Mr. Casgrain moved that the bill be rejected, which was lost. Mr. Edgar contended that it was an interference with civil rights. Mr. interference with civil rights. Mr. McCarthy argued that no law could be passed in regard to trade and commerce which did not, in some way or another, interfere with civil rights. The preamble

of the bill was lost by 25 to 35.

Carthy will now require to again introduce his measure in the commons, which means that the bill will, in all likelihood, be too late to pass this session.

In committee this morning Prof. Barre of Montreal was examined as to the advan-In committee this morning Prof. Barre of Montreal was examined as to the advantage of the centrifugal system of butter making in general use in Germany and Denmark, where the best butter in the world is made. He claimed that the centrifugal system was infinitely superior to the other methods, although it cost rather more to supply the plant necessary to establish a factory. He believed Canadian butter could be brought up to the standard of the Danish article. Mr. Barre said that in the last couple of years five factories working on the centrifugal plan had been established in Quebec and one in Ontario, while preparations were being made for putting up nine or ten more next spring. Mr. Barre suggested—

1. That an experimental station should be established by the government where knotty questions in butter-making could be solved, and that a dairy bureau of some kind should be associated with this station from which farmers could obtain advice.

2. Correct information about cheese making should be disseminated.

3. That a yearly statement of the number of cheese and butter factories with the

making should be disseminated.

3. That a yearly statement of the number of cheese and butter factories, with the methods used by them, should be published.

4. The services of a practical dairy man should be obtained by the government.

5. That dairy exhibitions should be organized and

6. That the best creameries should be used by the government as training schools.

The difficulty does not arise from the size of the room, but from the fact that a good nany M.P.'s don't owe anything to the locution master. They mumble and mutter instead of articulating distinctly. Nor is the unseemly mumbling confined to parliament. We meet it in presbytery, synod and general assembly. Even among men who are supposed to be trained speakers it often prevails to a most annoying extent. About one in ten articulate clearly and distinctly. Loudness is not the thing wanted. A man may speak so loud that you can't hear him. Noise is not voice. There should be an understanding in all public bodies that when a speaker is unhear; from mere slavenliness of utteris unheard from mere slovenliness of utter-ance he should be put down. It is little

better than an insult to any public body for a man to waste its time when he does not think man to waste its time when he does not think worth while to articulate so that an auditor a few feet away can hear him. There are few men so handsome that one cares to spend time in merely looking at them. An American gentleman once said that his minister preached excellent sermons so far as he could hear them, but as he preached from behind a forest it was difficult to follow him. There is no doubt but the forest some men cultivate on their faces interferes to some extent with the sound, but good articulation can overcome any reasonable forest. Some of the forests are
