DEATH OF DR. J. A.

McKENZIE, AT DARTMOUTH.

Deceased Was a Brother of Principal MacKenzie, of the Sydney Mines High School.

The death occurred at Dartmouth last Friday of Dr. John A. McKenzie, assistant superintendent of the Nova Scotia Hospital, and a brother of Principal G. W. MacKenzie, of the Sydney Mines High School.

Dr. MacKenzie died on the 40th anniversary of his birth, and the second anniversary of his marriage. With all connected with the institution he was a general favorite. With the staff he was held in the highest esteem, always reliable, always trustworthy.

Dr. MacKenzie was born at St. George's Channel, Richmond County, Cape Breton. He attended Pictou Academy and graduated from the College of Physicians and Surgeons, Boston, in 1892, and spent a year in the London hospitals. He was appointed Assistant Physician of the N. S. Hospital, N. v. 1893, and promoted to the position of Assistant Superintendent in June, 1895.

Two years ago he married Miss Mabel Gentles, daughter of H. B. Gentles, Dartmouth.

Dr. MacKenzie took ill a week ago last Saturday. Tuesday evening he was operated on for appendicitis, but his condition was such that the operation gave no relief. He passed away at an early hour Friday morning.

Dr. MacKenzie is survived by a widow mother, and two brothers. One of the latter, Simon, resides on the homestead. The other, George, is principal of the Sydney Mines School.

Rev. J. W. MacKenzie, missionary, who died in Corea, was a brother of deceased.
