Page 178 is very important one. It is a list of 200 words which is found in "The Stenographer," (issued in Philadelphia, 33 South Fourth Street,) No. July, 1892, page 123, where we read: "The following list contains two hundred common words. With a few possible exceptions it is believed that these are the two hundrd most frequently recurring words in the language. Hence the student or young reporter should learn to write this list at a high rate of speed. The writer must be most familiar with those words which occur the oftenest. To copy this list a hundred times would be time well spent."

Now if you doubt the veracity of the above, you need only take a text book, say the Third National Reader, for an instance, and read over a page or two, crossing the words that belong to the following table as they come along. Then count up the number of words you have crossed, and the words that are left untouched, and you will see the result.

Here follows the key to the two hundred word list, in the same order as they are in page 178 :---
