Minerals in New Bnusiwich.-The peopio of New Brunswick are becoming gradually awakozed to tho fact that tharo aro still many undeveloped resources in that Provinco, and as a resuit tho Cionia Land Office has of lato beon bo: reged with appicants for starching at.d prospecting licenses. Un Ustober 10th nu less than 300 appiica:ions fur aress wero fi ed. The graniest number of applications has beon from W'estmureland Cuunty, where it is hoped that vatuabo gold fieds may be oponed. Tho [isiser areas of Alboit Couniy aro also in puput 1 demand. Queons Cunty is said to bo about covored with applicatiuns fur cual scarching and pruspecting leasos, and a sinail excrimont has beon engendered by the diicusory of asbertos at Macadauvic in York County.

Canatian Vegetadles.--Canadians havo reasun to be p:oud of the vegetsble display in the Ilorticultura! Bua ding at tho World's Fair. It now goes w:thon: saying that Canadian appios have won tho laurols in t? fruit exhibit, and the superiority of tho vegetable oxhbit is being overy whore acknowledged. Nearly 400 variotios of potatoes are on oxhibition, and all varietios of boetg, cablages, and even sweet potatoes are also to bo soen. Tho search for poison in the doad tissucs of a buman boing mag bo a work of ume. In a recent caso it wa odly after an examination which was continutd for three months, that the presence of poison was doece:ed. Prof. Doremus, howerer, obj-cts docidedly to the modern process of embalming badies soon attor death with porsonuus chenical praparaions. Ho is of opin on that a loopholo ss thus offored to poisonord by which taoy may effectually concoal tho cause of doath, and ho thinks that tho law should iutorforo tu the mattor. The ontire article, though dealing with a gruseomo subjest, is of doep and unusual intorest.

Ther Want mae Farth-Thore is nota littloagitation in Govornment quartors over tho stato of Rideau Hall. Tho residerce of tho GovernorGoneral has boon a costly affair. What with alterations, additions, rifurnishing, otc., the nocds of tio vice-rogal court have been pretty steadily beforo our peoplo. Whilo it is but fitting that the ropresentatives of Hor Majesty should bo houscd in a mannor bofitting their exalted position, we yot seo no rearon why, aftor 80 many calls havo been made upon our peoplo for tho needs of tho Hall, that it should bo charactorised as "an o.d fashioned rookory, unfit for hsbitation." Rideau Hall to no palace, but it is and ehould be a comfortablo plac' of rosidence.

Tie Pnovincial Oister - Lovors of that luscious bivalvo, the oyster, will be glad to learn that effurts aro to bo mado to provent the desiruction or depietion of our Provincial oystor beds. Mr. Ernest Komp, an Figglish expert in ogster culturo, has boen examining tho oyater beds of Canada, and ho has now made a formal report on tho aubject is the Minister of Marino and Fishorios. Mr. Kemp attributes much of the falling off in the ofster bods to the use of oyster rakes. In winter ospecially ho considers that the use of rakes is most injurious to the bods. The rakes gather in oystors of all sizes, and the raker who assorts the shelfa losves the small oys!ors on the ico while he carries off all that are fiv fur market. The small oysters thus exposed perish on the ico and when a thaw comes they fall through breaking into and distuibing the beds below. It cin thus be readi $y$ seon that the ioniuval uf the yungg oystors is a sorious matter for while this constant destruction is going on the breoding of the shell fish is greatly interfored with. Another cause of troublo in the beds results from the misdirected work of the musso!-mud diggers. These men aro m st harmful to tho beds fus they mako great excaval.ons in search of shollesand in throw. ing the rofuse mud about, eflectually smother both oysters and broods. Mr. Kemip furthor suggests that a regular closo scason, from the first day of Juno to tho 15 th day of Soptomber, shall bo cbsorved, that ice fishing anc Sunday fishing shall be aliko prohibited, and that thi uso of tongs and dredges in place of the common rakes ehall be onforced. Should these precautions be obsorved ho is confident that our oystor bods would speedily become an excollent ard eteady sourco of income.

Civic Reforss.- It is ab .ut timo that the citizens of Halifax should rouso themselves from their torpid condition and take an active interest in cıvic affairs. Tho rapid way in which tho dobt of the city is mounting up is appalling. Ten jea s or 80 ago, whoa the old system of making tepants respuna.b.o for taxes was in vcgue and a laige percentage of taxes was loat, tho rato was 81.10. When the prosentexcellont systom, making the taxes a lien ald thus assuring their prompt and certsin col ection with a vory sm 11 percentage cfloss, was adopted, it was supposed that in a for years the rato rou'd be ducroased, but in spite of full col'ections, the rate has gone on increasing. until to-day it is $\$ 1.61$, with overy prospect of soon reaching the ruinous 82.00 mark. With surprivingly little to sbow for it, the debt of the city has roachod a cool milion, and new borrowing bills are still being moo ed. Tho lato meoting at th, Lyceum is a go:d indication of an awakoned interost in civic affuirs, and the question now arieos-what reforms are neceisary and whero shall wo begin ? Under section 290 of the Act to consolidato and amend the Ac's relating to the City of Halifax the Legislature his ompowarod the Council to assess annually a sum not to oxcerd 8110.000 fur st.tod civic purposos; and under section 291 it is also authorizsd to assess annually for somo twonty different purposes, iocluding charitabla institutions, the payment of interest on all monoys lawfully borrowed, all armoutis required fur sinking funds authorizod by the Logislature, and fo. the re-payment of tomporary loans authorized to be asscesed for as extra assesimont, ole. Formorly, it was the practice to go to the Logislature oach year for powers to assess stattd sums required for the joar's city business, and a roturn to this old practico might provo salutary, as at presont the full amount allowed under tho charter is always a bessed for, while each year syecial borrowing bills are boing carried through the Legislature for large amounts. The gitation to olect the in mbers of the Council by the rote of tho wholo city, instoad of by wards, as at present, scoms to havo many more disadvantages than advantages, and before adopting this course, it would be well to wait awhilo and see how the chango acts in St. John, where it ans lately b.cn carricd by a popular vote. Tho lars of tho city are oxcollent, and no improvement is requirod in them. What is wantod is better matorial in the Cuuncil, and a wiso oconomy in expenditure of the city funds. The selectiun of Aldormen is loft with tho voters, and if they will only orercise their powers $\begin{array}{r}\text { fith duo care the Council may bo parged of ita incompotont mem- }\end{array}$ ters, and thoir paces filled with ropresontative ci izens. Not that thero is not plonty of good material in tho present Council as there is, but a judicious woeding out would vastly improve its ability to deal with the very serious problems which a period of reckless extraraganco has precipitated.
