ADMINISTRATION OF JUSTICE

ALLEGED UNWARRANTED ATTACK BY GOVERNMENT ON INTEGRITY AND INDEPENDENCE OF NORTHWEST TERRITORIES SUPREME COURT

Miss Flora MacDonald (Kingston and the Islands): Mr. Speaker, in the absence of the Minister of Justice and the Prime Minister my question is directed to the Acting Prime Minister. I should like to ask him why the government has considered it necessary to launch, as Mr. Justice Morrow claims, an unwarranted attack by the executive of the Canadian government upon the integrity and independence of the Supreme Court of the Northwest Territories?

Hon. C. M. Drury (Acting Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, I think the Prime Minister made it quite clear yesterday that the government of Canada was not launching an unwarranted attack on the Supreme Court of the Northwest Territories.

Mr. Erik Nielsen (Yukon): Mr. Speaker, my question is supplementary. All the Prime Minister said yesterday was that he was going to discuss the matter with the Minister of Justice. If the government feels that there was not such an unwarranted attack on the Supreme Court in the Northwest Territories, why then did the government release the information to the media that writ of prohibition proceedings were going to be taken the day before the judgment of Mr. Justice Morrow was released?

Mr. Drury: I will have to discuss that with the Minister of Justice.

AGRICULTURE

MEASURES TO GUARANTEE PRICES TO FARMERS THAT WILL ENCOURAGE FOOD PRODUCTION

I think some of the things we have done have proven that the farmers are trying to respond. We will also do everything we can to see that the farmers get a proper economic return for their input if they are to be asked to control this terrible thing we all call inflation.

AIRPORTS

SUGGESTED DEFERMENT OR ELIMINATION OF INCREASE IN LANDING FEES FOR LIGHT AIRCRAFT—GOVERNMENT ACTION

I would refer the minister to the recommendation of the Standing Committee on Transport and Communications with regard to the deferment or elimination of any proposed increase in the landing charges for light aircraft at any airport coming under the jurisdiction of the Department of Transport. Would the minister advise what action has been taken and what his intention is with regard to this proposed increase?

Hon. Jean Marchand (Minister of Transport): Mr. Speaker, I think we accepted before the committee that we would delay this increase to October 1 instead of, I believe, July 1, if my memory serves me well. In the meantime, we are ready to receive all representations, and actually many people have come to see me about this.

RELOCATION OF RAILWAY TRACKS IN DOWNTOWN AREAS—POSSIBILITY OF LEGISLATION—REPLY TO MAYOR OF MONCTON

Mr. Charles H. Thomas (Moncton): Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Minister of State for Urban Affairs. Last October the minister, in conjunction with his colleague, the then minister of transport, issued a statement that the government would be seeking amendments to the Railway Act to provide funds for the relocation of railway tracks in downtown areas.
