My question is therefore directed to the Secretary of State. Is it false that Mr. Pratt is the President of Pfizer, a U.S. pharmaceutical company? Is it false that Mr. Pratt met with our Ambassador to the United States, Mr. Gotlieb? Is it false that Mr. Pratt put pressure on Mr. Gotlieb to amend our patent legislation? Is it false that as a result of such pressure, the Canadian Government amended our legislation as a favour to Mr. Pratt and others?

REPRESENTATIONS MADE TO CANADIAN AMBASSADOR

Right Hon. John N. Turner (Leader of the Opposition): Mr. Speaker, sometimes the glare of the truth blinds the Minister. I will direct a further question to him. When the Secretary of State for External Affairs first read the text of the affidavit which was deposited with our Embassy in Washington 72 hours ago, did he inquire as to the position of Mr. Pratt who was not only the president of a leading American pharmaceutical company but also the President's Chairman of the Advisory Committee on Trade Negotiations? Did he inquire whether that placed undue pressure upon our ambassador?

Right Hon. Joe Clark (Secretary of State for External Affairs): No, Mr. Speaker, I did not make those inquiries. The ambassador has made it clear that his recollection of the events referred to in the affidavit differ from that of the person who signed the affidavit.

REPRESENTATIONS ALLEGEDLY MADE TO GOVERNMENT

Mr. Dave Dingwall (Cape Breton—East Richmond): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs. We know that Canada and in fact the ambassador in Washington were lobbied on the drug legislation by the Chairman of the President's Advisory Committee on Trade Negotiations who also happens to be the president of one of the most influential and profitable drug companies in the world.

How can the Minister reconcile his persistent statements in this House that he received no representations whatsoever from the United States when the document says unequivocally that there were representations made to the Canadian Government? Will the Minister explain to the House that this is in fact a contradiction made by him and his Government to cover up the fact that the multinational corporations are writing Canadian legislation affecting our senior citizens?
