It is impossible to obtain proper records of wind unless it is obtained from unobstructed sites and this is as important today, but more difficult to obtain than it ever was, on account of more obstructions by buildings &c.

The Canadian Government is ~~engaged~~ establishing an air port across the river from Montreal and it is most desirable that perfect predictions and warnings should be supplied to men operating air ships & aeroplanes.

Might I suggest that you get the government to supply the requirements in order that Canada may give the best possible support to our air force.
