The prinoiples which govern research work should be uniform throughout the University. The difficultues which you suggest are sueh as might easily arise in any department of the University and we have not so far failed to solve them.

The question of salaries is one which involves a very earerul inguiry into the cost of Iiving at liacdonaid College and in Montreal. I do not think that there is any instperable difficulty here, and I have no hesitatian in assuring you that the professors in the Faculty of Agrioulture will. receive absolutely faix treatment. Promotion is and must always be carried out with the good of the University only in पiow. If a professor at Macdomald seems the most suitable person for promotion in his department, he will assurediy receive it. I cannot sae that any hardship would be morked in this way.

It may be desirable to complete the work of fusing departments at once: it may, on the other hand, prove dosirable to let them stand. Of those to which you refer the only Cerinitely scientific department is Bacteriology; and I see no insuperable obstacle to the arrangem mont in that case. It is not quite correct to say that the Department of Cellulase Chemistry is not under Ohemistry. It is on the same footing as the other lafge subdivisions of the Department of Ghomistry and warks as they do, more or less as a separate entity, but all subdivisions together form the Depaxtment of Chemistry. I see no reason, therefore, why we should not have a Department of
