Theatres and Concerts

Cyril Maude on Monday.
Toronto is to have a genuine first night Monday evening. It is not in any sense one of these trial performances with which local theatregoers are so familiar. The beginning of Mr. Cyril Maude's first American tour that evening at the Princess Theatre is really an event of the highest importance in the world of the drama, literature, fine art and society. Mr. Maude is one of the most distinguished actors of whom the English-speaking stage is fortunate to boast. At the present time, so far as his hold upon the affections of the playgoers of the British metropolis that hitherto he has been forced to decline offers, no matter how tempting, for a visit to either Canada, the United States or Australia. Mr. Maude comes to this country under the auspices of the Liebler Company, who have brought him, Sir Forbes Robertson, Gertrude Elliott, Mrs. Patrick Campbell, Madame Duse, Madame Simone and half a dozen more of the greatest artists who have adorned the English and European stages. "Teddies" has been selected for Monday and Tuesday evenings and Wednesday matinee. "The Second in Command" for Wednesday and Thursday nights; and W. W. Jacobs' wonderfully picturesque story of "Beauty and the Beast" for Friday and Saturday nights and Saturday matinee. These three plays will show Mr. Maude in widely dissimilar roles, and in at least two of his own favorite characters. It is to be sincerely hoped that he will give the Princess Theatre a special matinee of "The Headmaster" the command performance which he gave before the Majestic at Balmoral Castle just prior to his sailing. Another hoped-for performance would be "The Admirable Crichton," the adaptation made by Louis J. Barker, author of "Joseph and His Brethren." Mr. Maude's daughter, Margaret, and her sister, Fawcett, are principals in his support.

Miss Billie Burke Again at the Princess.
It was only last March that Miss Billie Burke charmed Toronto theatre-goers with her fine impersonation of Lily Parradell in Pinero's "The Mind That Won't Be Conquered." She returned to the Princess week after next to present "The Amazons," another of Pinero's numerous plays, but one of an entirely different kind. "The Amazons" is a whimsical comedy, and is the most popular of all the dramatists lighter work. In a swaggering little tom-boy, Miss Burke gets her first chance to appear in boy's clothes, and the New York critics say she is delightful in them.

"The Spendthrift" at the Grand.
Porter Emerson Browne's remarkable social drama, "The Spendthrift," which will be the attraction at the Grand next week, brings up some of the most interesting social problems of the world today. The play is one of ideas, and depicts a certain phase of life which are to be found in many homes. It tells the story of the week of a family's happiness, brought about by the sudden death of a husband and the different paths followed in the pursuit of happiness by the husband and wife. Richard Ward is a man of working hours, and his wife, Mrs. Stevens, is a home-loving instinct. He works for luxuries, and in his love for her, he is kept grinding and toiling under a mountain of debt which topples over on him and he is bankrupt. One of the most appealing points in the play is the wife's extravagance is dominant. It is brought about in a great measure through her sincere endeavor to provide for her husband with a better position in life she believes him big enough to occupy. When she realizes that he is bankrupt she borrows money in an effort to save him. This move on her part leads to dramatic situations, the unravelling of which has made "The Spendthrift" not only a problem play of real life of today, with its motive an arraignment of puerile society life, but a seen it have declared "strikes home" in a most impressive and interesting way.

Thanksgiving Entertainment.
William Campbell has completed the advance programme of his annual Thanksgiving entertainment to be given in Massey Hall on Monday evening, Oct. 20. The headliner in this instance will be Frank Yelch, who will give his latest picture travel talk, entitled "Memories of the Moirland," England, Ireland and Scotland, illustrated with stereoscopic views. The musical part of the programme will be furnished by the 4th Highlanders Band; Mrs. Flora Foster, soprano; Miss Barbara Foster, contralto, and Mr. Donald C. McGregor, baritone, who will contrastly enhance the entertainment. The band will play appropriate selections and the vocalists will render a number of national songs. While on a recent visit to the British Isles Mr. Yelch secured many new and beautiful pictures, which will be presented on Thanksgiving Night. This entertainment should prove a very strong attraction for the holiday night, especially as it will be given at popular prices.

Mercedes Will be the Headliner at Shea's.
At Shea's Theatre next week Manager Shea has secured for his headliner attraction the Great Mercedes, the musical enigma. No other act on the stage is like the offering of Mercedes. At the opening of the act he requests those in the audience to fix their minds upon some selection of music they would like to hear. He then enters in an elaborate setting, Miss Stanton, a beautiful blindfold at a grand piano. No sooner is the wish of the audience made known to Mercedes than the pianist immediately plays the selection. The performance is astounding. Mercedes and his assistant, who have appeared in this country for only a short time, have been the sensation of the musical and theatrical students of Paris and London. This act is sure to be the talk of the town before the end of the week.

Charles F. Semon, the Narrow Fellow, is always welcome. His appearance is funny, and his songs are unusual. His musical instruments are as original as his maker and manipulator. Mr. Semon is an eccentric comedian as well as a musician. Another welcome feature on the week's bill is Trovelli, presenting his ventriloquist comedy drama, "At the Ritz House with the Little Chauffeur." Trovelli is among the cleverest ventriloquists on the stage, and is an immense favorite with Shea'sgoers. The Great Asahi, assisted by the magic mystery, "The Human Fountain," is a sensational number of their offerings. It is a spectacular bit of work, in which Asahi causes a stream of water to project wherever he waves his fan. The Kitamura Boys in their Ritzley work are the feature of the act. The Cabaret Trio appears here for the first time, and is just what the name indicates. The members sing and dance delightfully, and the comedy in their offering is bright and up-to-date. Juggling de Lisle is and favorite with Shea'sgoers, and his feats of juggling begin where many others leave off. The show for the week closes with a new picture on the kinetograph.

In order that it might be in time for Saturday's newspapers, Mme. Melba's program for her Tuesday night concert was wired to Massey Hall from Montreal yesterday. As the Montreal concert was the first of this season in America, the numbers given in that city have been revised for Toronto, which will be the prima donna's second and last appearance in Canada for this year. Liza Lehmann, her friend of many years. It is a setting of Henry Kingsley's poem, "Maggie," and she will sing, "Depuis le Jour," from Louise, "Adieu," from Boileau, and "Bade adieu," from Lalo. Mr. Burke will sing an aria from Benvenuto Cellini (Diaz), Mephistopheles' Song in Auerbach's Cellar (Moussofsky) and two groups of songs. M. Moysse will be heard in two flute numbers and will play the obblato to the "Mad Scene" aria. The company will be M. Gabriel Lapierre.
