Holds daily conferences with players and points out mistakes made in previous day's game. Never chides a young player in angry tones for misplays, but quietly corrects him when alone. He has not worn a baseball uniform in many years, his voice is never heard in protest on the field. Is a firm believer in developing young players by keeping them on the bench to watch older men. Always on the alert to detect opposing batsman's weakness. Can solve them better than his pitcher or catcher. Has no hard and fast rules governing old players at the bat. Gives them the attitude of using their own discretion.


Westmoreland Won Bulk of the Prizes
