Mostly Women.

Miss Evelyn Johnston of London announced that there are now 12,445 teachers in Ontario and that 11,315 are women, the statement being made in the course of her presidential address to the Federation of Women Teachers' Associations of Ontario. She affirmed that they were going to raise the professional status of the women teacher by raising the financial status first. She urged her audience to be loyal to the profession; to seek legislation to have a minimum salary for the province; to seek to have experience in any part of the province recognized in every other part; to elect women trustees on school boards; to agitate for a fair representation of women on the O.E.A. directorate; to have the legislative committee introduce resolutions to improve the women teachers' financial status; to see that the public school section discuss improved conditions for them.

Methods in shorthand were discussed in the commercial section by C. E. Jamieson, B.A., of Peterboro, who advised pupils to learn and use the deaf and dumb alphabet as a means of limbering the fingers. In an address on bookkeeping. A. F. Sproat deprecated the present system of instruction, which he said required too many definitions and was apt to give the learner a wrong idea by the presentation of puzzling problems.

A plea for the study of Spanish was made by Prof. M. A. Buchanan, who stated that it has become the most popular modern language during recent years, and that it is indispensable to international intercourse. In New York Spanish leads in the number of students who are following it, and in Toronto, at the university, the enrolment rose from 90 to 280 during the last year.

How domestic Science.

How domestic science is taught in England was told by Miss E. A. Hickmans before the teachers of that branch. The course for girls includes the practical work of washing, the pupils bringing their own laundry. They are also taught to cook in the same practical way by bringing the ingredients for the family meal, which they carry home after cooking. Miss Cora Winchell asked for an extension of the science, which would enable those taking the course to work as caterers, lunch room managers and caterers, lunch room managers and

dieticians.

Public health as it affects the growth of a nation was discussed by George A. Putnam, superintendent of women's institutes, to the delegates, many of whom took advantage of the lectures at the university. The speaker pointed out that the women of the institutes had a great opportunity for service by instilling into others the principles of safeguarding health, to which attention was not sufficiently given. The ordinary well-to-do citizen does not bother enough about his own health or that of his children, said Mr. Putnam. Many parents, too, neglect the study of food values and what foods are good for their children.
