In the presence of a large attendance of the members of Grace Church, the tablet erected to the memory of the late rector, Rev. Joshua Pitt Lewis, was yesterday morning unveiled by the church wardens, W. J. Elhott, J. W. Congdon, Henry Taylor and H. C. For-tier, assisted by Rev. Mr. Fidler, the

The tablet is of brass, and is erected in the tablet is of brass, and is erected in the nave at the northeasterly portion of the sacred edifice. Following the regular services of the church, Rev. T. W. Powell, Eglinton, delivered an eloquent address based on Paul's Epistle to the Hebrews, xi. 4. Commenting on the life of the late rector, he points the life of the late rector, he paid a glowing tribute to the earnestness and zeal for souls which had characterized his whole life.

The words of the text, "He being

dead, yet speaketh," were in a marked degree borne out in the influence of that good man whose memory they had met to honor. It was not what a man said or did which constituted his greatness in the sight of God. A great spiritual uplift had followed in the wake of the late rector. The moulding of true manhood and womanhood was the uppermost thought in his life, and to his earnestness the speaker owed much of whatever success in spiritual matters he had attained.
