FIREMEN STOOD GUARD WHILE CITIZENS WORKED

Thorold People Have a Little Brush With the Electric Railway.

ST. CATHARINES, Aug. 8.—(Special.)—There were things at Thorold, between 2 and 4 o'clock this morning, which had a striking resemblance to a miniature war.

Not long ago the town began the installation of waterworks and the council decided to lay a main beneath the trestle to the building, which will be used as a pumping station.

About 1 o'clock this morning Roadmaster Carriand and a force of several dozen Italians departed on a flat car for the scene of the work.

In the meantime the company's gang had completed its labors and had made a hasty retreat. Thorold firemen were at the Walkerville tournament and had not returned, but the townsmen manned the engine and the trench was flooded to keep the concrete wet while the Italians employed by the town waterworks and the contractors were hurriedly awakened.

This force rushed with pick and shovel to the trench and the fast hardening cement was removed. Citizens firemen then mounted guard over the work, and then the red coats assumed control and kept three lines of hose in readiness to repel any attacks by the railway gang.

The company claims to have a deed to the right of way and claims the town is trespassing upon its property.

TORONTO JUNCTION, Aug. 8.—A Toronto woman, Mrs. Janet Tulloch, paid a visit to the Junction last night, was entertained later at police headquarters and was introduced to Police Magistrate Ellis this morning in his official capacity.

DISASTROUS FIRE THIS WIPES OUT AYTON MILLS

AYTON, Aug. 8.—A disastrous fire occurred at Hampden, near Ayton, this afternoon, when the extensive sawmill, single and lathe mills owned and operated by the Miller & Seim firm, were wiped out by fire. Their entire stock of this season's cutting of lumber, lath and shingles is completely gone, including the three mills and machinery, with a total loss of \$7000.
