MR. ROBERT O'HARA IS DEAD.

He Was a Graduate of Upper Canada College and His Children

O'Hara was one of the best known citizens of Chatham and Kent County. Born in Hampshire, England, in 1823, when still a boy he came to Canada with his fainer, the late Col. Waiter. O'Hara, K.T.S.P. of Her Majesty's 47th Regiment, who died in Toronto some years ago. Deceased was educated at Upper Canada College, and, gradualting therefrom, was shortly after called to the bar. In 1868 he married Mass Maria. S. Dobbs, a daughter of Kev. F. W. Dobbs of Portsmouth, Ont., and a cousin of Sir Richard Cartwright. The surviving members of the family are Mrs. O'Hara, the widow; Waiter F. O'Hara, P.L.S., at present in charge of a Dominion Government surveying party in Alberta; w. C. T. O'Hara, private secretary to the Minister of Trade and Commerce, Ottawa; K. Murray O'Hara of the Canadian Bank of Commerce Ottawa; Kathieen and Geotirey at home. Mr. O'Hara more than 30 years ago was appointed local Master-in-Chancery and retained the position until his death. He was a lover of shooting, and the St. Ann's Island Fishing and Shooting Club counts him one of the original members. In his early life in Chatham the Indians of St. Clair flats named Mr. O'Hara, who was a noted shot, "Saw-wingoosh," when Lord Wolseley, General Gibbon, and Bradford and other British army officers were shooting companions of the deceased on the St. Clair marsnes, waiter and Charles O'Hara, Toronto, are brothers, and Mrs. W. 
