TRAFFIC OF MONTREAL PORT

August 7th.

Total Revenue Derived From Imports and Exports Since Navigation Opened is \$110,000.

Shipping Returns Satisfactory

Advance is Entirely Due to the Increase in Imports.

Montreal, Aug. 6.—The traffic of the port continues to pursue the upward movement.

The total revenues derived from imports and exports by the Collector of Customs since the opening of navigation have been \$110,000.40, against \$88,633.09 last year.

This represents an increase of \$21,367.40.

The advance in port revenues is entirely due to the increased imports.

From this source no less than \$75,000 was derived, against \$54,000.

The revenue from exports showed a decline of \$500.

The shipping returns are also satisfactory.

The number of ocean-bound vessels that arrived here from the opening of navigation to the 1st of August was 367, as against 375 last year, and the tonnage 726,988, as against 718,082.

This does not equal the 1890 tonnage, which reached 718,000, the biggest on record, but was much more than that for 1900, which did not exceed 644,312.

The inland vessels that have arrived since the opening of navigation number 4122, against 3990 last year, and the tonnage reaches 824,701, as against 743,926.
