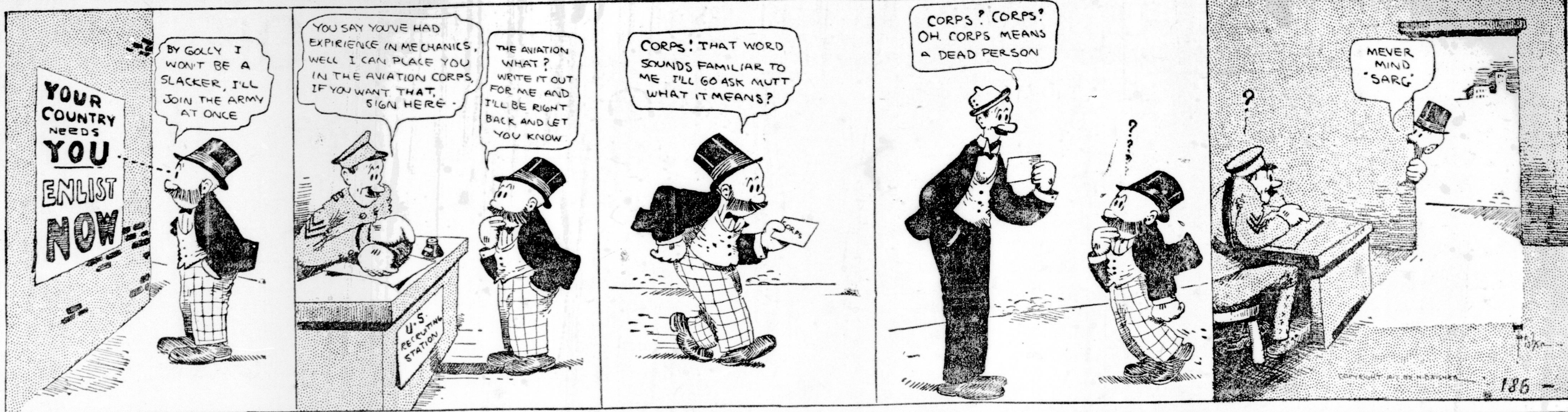


MUTT AND JEFF.—Jeff Didn't Want To Be Dead Before He Started.

NO MAJOR LEAGUE BALL IF WAR STILL ON IN 1918

Majority of Players Eligible Under Conscription Laws, Says Ban Johnson in Interview at New York—Leaves to Confer With Government.

NEW YORK, May 1.—President Ban Johnson of the American League announced here this afternoon that in case the war continued until next spring, there would be no attempt to open the 1918 pennant season.

Mr. Johnson expressed his belief that a majority of the American League players were eligible under the proposed terms of the conscription laws, and would be called upon to serve in the army. Mr. Johnson will leave for Washington tonight to confer with Government authorities regarding the proposed law to be imposed upon baseball clubs, and the question of the enlistment of players will also be discussed.

Mr. Johnson said that he had not discussed the proposition to drop baseball at the close of the present season, and that such action would depend upon the developments of the next few months. He stated it as his opinion that the young men of the States would be called upon to serve with the army and navy, and that the ball players of both the major and minor leagues would naturally be conscripted owing to their excellent physical condition.

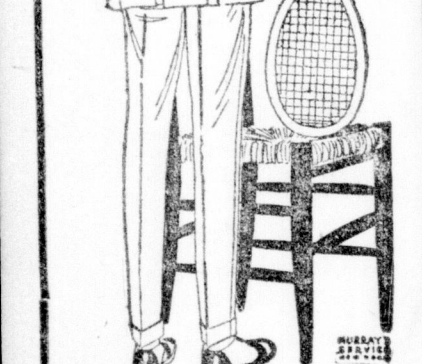

WELSH IS OUTPOINTED IN TEN-ROUND BOUT WITH JOHNNY KILBANE

Famous Welshman's Defence Work Feature of Fight.

CAN HOLD CHAMPIONSHIP

Is Safeguarding His Lightweight Title as Valuable Financial Asset.

NEW YORK, May 1.—Johnny Kilbane of Cleveland, featherweight champion of America, outpointed Freddie Welsh of Wales, world's champion lightweight in eight of the ten rounds of a boxing match here tonight, according to opinion of experts about the ring. It was apparent, however, to the observer who is familiar with Welsh's policy in safeguarding his lightweight title, which he regards as a valuable financial asset, that the lightweight champion felt it incumbent upon himself to fight a purely defensive battle. Kilbane, young, rugged and aggressive, realizing that to add the lightweight championship to his legitimate title would mean much to him, constantly bored in and used all his natural advantages against his older opponent. To the fight fan, who revels in the slashing, slugging exhibition and expects a title-holder to expose his vulnerable points for the education of his antagonist and the spectators, Welsh did not make a pleasing showing. But the lightweight champion did all that he had set out to do and did it well. Welsh fought a purely defensive fight and demonstrated that Johnny Kilbane has only an outside chance of coping with the lightweight champion so long as Welsh retains possession of his wonderful defensive ability.

When it comes to brainy baseball, Ty is absolutely in a class by himself."
