"AGGIES" WIN FIRST CONTEST OF SEASON FROM GALT BOYS

Guelph Senior Aggregation Victors by 28 to 12.

GUELPH, Oct. 6.—The Guelph Collegiate Institute football team, three times champions of the Inter-Scholastic League, started off the season in their first regular scheduled game of the season by defeating the Galt Collegiate team at the O. A. C. campus by 28 to 12. This score just about indicates the playing qualities of the two teams, although the visitors presented a much heavier lineup than last year, and were enabled to break through much more often and with better results.

They held the Guelph fourteen well during the first half, but in the second half the local team rolled up a large score. The half-time score was 12 to 11 in favor of Guelph, each team scoring two tries, Galt converting one of theirs.

The Guelph team presented a strong and aggressive line, and the feature of its work was the speed with which it pulled off its plays, putting the ball into play many times before its opponents had a chance to line up. For the home team the honors went to Buckland, Creelman, Smith and Carroll, while the other members of the team also did well. For Galt, Gardner at outside wing was the star, and was repeatedly used as a battering ram with good result.

WAR'S END MEANS RETURN OF SPORT THROUGH CANADA

Athleticism Will Be Placed on More Sound Basis With the Return of Men From Overseas—Canadian League More Than Likely.

With the cessation of hostilities in Europe, pre-war days of sport will be the vogue for 1919. A re-establishment of the major baseball league, the reorganization of the old Canadian league and every other variety of sport will again be the fashion for the coming year. Gradually various forms of athletic sport throughout the continent have been greatly curtailed during the past four years, the war outlook being directly responsible for the curtailment in the United States and the dearth of sportsmen, the reason for the pronounced abatement in the Dominion. These conditions will be no more. The Kaiser's mad dreams of universal conquest have been forever squelched. The world will resume its peaceful aspect, and among the minor results will be the participation of returned soldiers in those athletic diversions which they so cherished and which assisted them so materially in their war work.

Canadian League. Even should the so-called cry of peace of the German Government develop into another "peace offensive," it is so noted, the most pessimistic would admit that the war will come to an end, if not this winter, in the early spring of next year. And with the dawn of peace comes a revival of all lines of sport. Present indications point to the re-establishment of the Canadian League. In the anticipation of war for 1919, Toronto baseball magnates declared that an attempt would be made to gather together all

the married professional ball players with previous experience in the international and major leagues, and with them form a minor league, such as existed in Ontario three years before the war, and one year after its beginning. With no war for 1919 a Canadian League is assured.

In fact, real sport will come back. The half-baked variety of athletics which has characterized sporting endeavor for the last two years will be no more. Four hundred thousand sportsmen, now overseas, will attend to this. Those of the sporting element who return will become engaged again in their favorite pastimes, and those whose tendencies were not toward athletics before enlistment have all been convinced of its value. Hence a large increase of sporting public for Canada and the United States at the war's end.

Horse Racing, Too. Horse racing, which has been on the wane across the border, will become even more popular than in ante-bellum days. The war has furnished sufficient excitement for the average citizen for four years. With the conflict terminated the demand for excitement will not end. And the agency that will be used to satisfy the public craving will be, among other sports, horse racing.

It is said that the success of Allied arms may be traced to the sporting enthusiasm of the Allied soldiers. The achievements of sportsmen in France, Macedonia, Palestine and all the war fronts are too well known for any comment. When these men return they will bring back sport—and bring it back strong.

TORONTO MATTILANDS WIN THE CANADIAN LACROSSE HONORS

ST. CATHARINES, Oct. 6.—Although they trimmed the Mattilands of Toronto in a lacrosse game here Saturday afternoon at the C. L. A. championship, the St. Kitts team went down to defeat on the round, losing the Canadian lacrosse honors by a single point. Under a disadvantage of three points, which the Mattilands piled up in the game at Toronto last Saturday, the St. Kitts strove desperately to win, falling short by a single notch, the final score being St. Kitts 8, Mattilands 6. St. Kitts started things in the first quarter, scoring three points, thereby completely offsetting the Mattilands' advantage. However the Toronto team came to life in the fourth period, after scoring twice to the St. Kitts' team's eight. The final quarter was the deciding one, and the Toronto aggression penetrated the defenses of St. Kitts four times, just enough to win. MALLEABLES TAKE FIRST OF SEMI-FINALS FROM KITCHENER

Brantfordites Have All the Breaks and Trim Opponents by 6 to 5 in O. B. A. A. Semi-Finals at the Telephone City.

BRANTFORD, Oct. 5.—Kitchener and the Brantford Malleables had a battle royal here on Saturday in the O. B. A. A. semi-finals. The Brantford Club won out in the tenth on clean hitting by the score of 6 to 5. The Brantford management, before the contest started, claimed the game by forfeit as Kitchener presented only eight of their regular players, filling in with Hiller from one of the other teams in Kitchener. Manager Roeding announced that Spanish influenza was responsible for four of his players being laid up. It was agreed, however, to proceed with the game, as there was quite a crowd, despite an occasional drizzle.

A good line was secured on the merits of the two teams, and there were local fans present who credited the visitors with being the better ball team. Shirk, the big hurler of the Kitchener team, had a lot of stuff, but proved no rainy weather pitcher. He issued nine passes, the last one in the tenth turning out fatal, and also hit

two batters. It was apparent to Brantford fans that Johnson, the Malleable pitcher, who has been doing a lot of work of late did not extend himself to the limit. Johnson did not strike out an opposing batsman, but he used his under-hand delivery with a change of pace with great effort. The two pitchers should certainly provide a battle royal in the next game at Kitchener on Saturday.

Throw Away Chances. The visitors threw away chances by loose base running. In the second and third innings Shack Dunbrook and Seaber over-ran ordinary base hits and were easy outs on the paths, the latter being handled by several Brantford players in the process. What looked like real rallies were broken up by the Kitchener themselves, Brantford scoring four in the fourth. Hits by Curry, McMahon, Stuart, a dead ball and a pass, with a line drive to left by Symons, put the Malleables ahead.

In the fifth Shirk's single scored Toletski, while in the sixth Toletski's triple, after Johnson had walked two, tied the score. Cochrane ended the round by flying to short. Kitchener got men on bases in the succeeding rounds, but the needed tally was not forthcoming. In the tenth, the seventh round, play.
