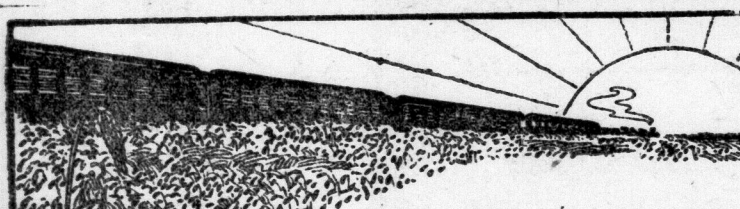

## FAMILIES HOMELESS AS RIVER THAMES FLOODS AT MOUTH

Four-Mile Carrier of Ice Resists Dynamite.

CHATHAM, March 19.—Many families have been rendered temporarily homeless as a result of the flooding of the River Thames at Prairie Siding, caused by a four-mile ice jam. Some families are still at their homes, but are forced to dwell in the upper rooms. They move from place to place in boats. The flood has developed to serious proportions, and has caused damage which will run into hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Barns washed away. Reports received here late this afternoon were to the effect that the water is still steadily rising. The inundated area covers many square miles. Barns and farm buildings have been washed from the foundations, and are floating with the current. While most of the farmers were able to remove their farm stock to higher ground when the flood threatened, considerable stock was still in the vicinity when the river overflowed its banks. Chickens and pigs were seen swimming floating on straw stacks.

A special committee of the Kent County Council is superintending blasting operations at the ice jam, which is now reported to be about four miles long and forms a solid wall of ice to the river bed. The work was continued yesterday and today with very little success, though the committee is persisting in its efforts in the hope that some measure of relief will be gained.

G. T. R. TRAINS STOPPED.  
Service on the Grand Trunk Railway has been temporarily suspended between here and Windsor as a result of the flood. The water is reported to have caused serious washouts, and it was stated this afternoon that the railroad was unable to do attempt to do anything until the water subsides. Three trains will arrive in the city from the east at 8:35 a.m., 1:20 p.m., and 7:40 p.m. and will return to London, until flood conditions are better. The water was reported this afternoon to have reached the C. P. R. tracks at Jeanette's Creek.

GAS SUPPLY CUT.  
A break in what is known as the northern pipeline, which supplies the city of Windsor, has occurred near Prairie Siding, and as a result of this, the gas supply to the city has been cut off. The gas companies are working to repair the line, but it is estimated that it may be necessary to shut some of them in, partly because of the water and gas companies. Such action will have a serious effect on the gas situation here.

It was reported this evening that the Thames has overflowed its embankments three miles east of the city, where the lands are low-lying, but the inundation at that point is not regarded as serious.

HORSE DROWNED.  
J. J. O'Brien lost a valuable horse in Indian Creek, near the city limit, last night. Driving to his farm in Harwich, the buggy skidded into the stream at a point where the road was flooded. The horse was drowned before he could secure help.

NO TRAINS LEAVE WINDSOR.  
WINDSOR, March 19.—The first time in years, the Grand Trunk found itself unable to give service out of Windsor today. From points as far east as Prairie Siding and Jeanette's Creek, reports came this morning of washouts of various degrees of severity.

At one point, according to local railwaymen, the water had reached the height of four feet above the rails, and was threatening to wash away the embankment at other points.

In the vicinity of Belle River, where the right-of-way passes within a few feet of Lake St. Clair, the heavy rains of last night and today made railway traffic dangerous.

No mails have reached this city since last night. Outgoing trains in some cases were cancelled, but where possible passenger traffic was taken care of by running trains out of Detroit, via Port Huron and through the St. Clair Tunnel.

WILL CONSTRUCT PORT.  
Paris, March 20.—The trans-Atlantic syndicate, a French corporation, plans to construct a new port at Honfleur, eight miles southeast of Havre. It is the intention eventually to join the port of Honfleur to that of Havre.

## CANADIAN HOSPITAL IN NEW YORK IS GIVEN O. K. BY CLUB MEMBERS

New York, March 19.—The proposal for the erection of a Canadian hospital in New York, which has been launched by a number of former Canadians resident here, was considered by the executive committee of the Canadian Club at a meeting last night. The scheme was outlined in a letter from J. P. Bettinson, one of the chief organizers. The committee passed a resolution declaring the idea a commendable one, but took no definite steps to give it the official sanction of the club. The majority of those who are interested in the proposed hospital are members of the Canadian Club, but the club as an organization is not promoting it.

Mr. Bettinson was formerly a citizen of St. John, N. B. He has lived in New York for the past thirty years.
