GOOD HEALTH IS THE SUREST SAFEGUARD

Vitality and Thus Protects Against Disease.

CHATHAM, March 19.—Many families have been rendered temperarily homeless as a result of the flooding of the River Thames at Prairie Siding, caused by a four-mile ice jam. Some families are still at their homes, but are forced to dwell in the upper rooms. They move from place to place in boats. The flood has developed to serious proportions, and has caused damage which will run into hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Reports received here late this afternoon were to the effect that the water is still steadily rising. The inundated area covers many square miles.

Barns and farm buildings have been washed from the foundations, and are floating with the current. While most of the farmers were able to remove their farm stock to higher ground when the flood threatened, considerable stock was still in the vicinity when the river overflowed its banks. Chickens and pigs were seen this morning floating on straw stacks.

A special committee of the Kent County Council is superintending blasting operations at the ice jam, which is now reported to be about four miles long and forms a solid wall of ice to the river bed. The work was continued yesterday and today with very little success, though the committee is persisting in its efforts in the hope that some measure of relief will be gained.

G. T. R. TRAINS STORPED enza throughout Canada is one of grave concern. It is quite true that the number of cases does not constitute an epidemic such as caused the suffering and sorrow during the terrible days of 1918. Such action will have a serious effect on the gas situation here.

It was reported this evening that the Thames has overflowed its embankments three miles east of the city, where the lands are low-lying, but the inundation at that point is not regarded as serious.
