ST. THOMAS RACE TRACK TO BE USED FOR BUILDING LOTS

Lumber in Grand Stand and Stables To Be Sold.

ST. THOMAS, April 19.—The half-mile track of the St. Thomas Race Association in the southeast end of the city will be leveled, the buildings, grandstand and stables pulled down, and the lumber used for building purposes. The track was built about ten years ago, and the first few years of its life were not without some success, but lately little interest was taken by St. Thomas people in the sport and the lease of the land took possession. George McCall, the proprietor of the Queen's when in St. Thomas, was the leading spirit in the local racing world, to him in general was due the little success which followed the efforts of the association to find a place for St. Thomas on the western circuit. The land is part of the old Canada Southern Survey, and will be sold for building lots.

CANADA'S TOTAL OF POTATOES EXPORTED

OTTAWA, April 19.—(By Canadian Press).—A total of 4,150,847 bushels of potatoes were exported from Canada to all countries from August 1, 1918, to July 31, 1919. This information was given to Mr. T. W. Caldwell in the House of Commons today. The month of May, 1919, was the banner one during this period. In that month, the total export was \$77,650 bushels. August, 1918, was the smallest, with a total export of 4,221 bushels.

FEW FRAUD CASES IN RE-ESTABLISHMENT

OTTAWA, April 19.—There have been only three or four cases of fraud in connection with the federal emergency fund for the re-establishment of returned soldiers, according to a return tabled in the Commons today. There had been many cases of attempted fraud, but money had not been paid over.

KILLED ON CANADIAN RAILWAY FOR NINE MONTHS TOTAL 223

Those Injured Number 1,502 in Same Period.

OTTAWA, April 19.—(By Canadian Press).—The report of the board of railway commissioners, covering the nine months ending December 31, 1919, gives the number of persons killed as 223, and the injured 1,502. In a total of 1,347 railway accidents. The report indicates an increase in automobile accidents at crossings. From April 1, 1918, to December 31, 1919, they numbered 221. In the nine-month period specially covered by the report 13 persons were killed and 247 injured in train derailments, and 38 killed and 138 injured at level crossings. In the same time 64 passengers on the right-of-way were killed and 68 injured. The board will not take any action in the matter of daylight saving, says the report.

CLERK OF NORFOLK BURNED BY A GAS EXPLOSION IN VAULT

Elias Boughner, Although Painfully Injured, Saved Books and Papers.

SIMCOE, April 19.—Elias Boughner, county clerk of Norfolk, narrowly escaped serious injury this morning by an explosion of gas in the vault in his office. His face and hands were burned and his clothing was on fire for a short time. A leak in the gas jet which supplies light in the vault had not been noticed by Mr. Boughner until he struck a match. He saved the books and papers from damage.

TO SEEK LEGAL OPINION BEFORE DRY DISCUSSION

Ontario Legislature Wants Light Thrown On the Referendum.

HEATING APARTMENTS

J. W. Curry Would Compel Landlords To Keep Temperature Up.

(Special To The Advertiser.)

TORONTO, April 19.—When the next temperance legislation is brought forward in the Ontario Legislature, members will probably have before them the much discussed legal opinion in relation to the jurisdiction of the province in prohibitory enactments. Hon. Mr. Ferguson enumerated the legal opinion in question, as those of Messrs. Murdock, K.C., of Toronto; J. A. Patterson, K.C., of Toronto; J. E. Ewart, K.C., Ottawa, and also those of the deputy minister of justice at Ottawa. "I understand," he said, "these men have all very strong views that the province has absolute jurisdiction to deal with this matter without a referendum at all, and that may be the subject of some argument and debate in the House."

"The opinions of these men who have gone into the matter with a view of very great assistance to the House." To Table Opinions. "I think we can undertake to table the opinions that have been given," declared Premier Drury, who intimated that the temperance legislation would be reintroduced in a day or so.

Louise, and some applause greeted the introduction by Mr. J. W. Curry, K.C., of a bill which he said would compel landlords to keep temperature in apartment houses up to a certain degree. Premier Drury was curious to know if the bill went as far as to regulate the other extreme and provided penalties to compel landlords to keep the heat down to a certain temperature. Mr. Curry's answer was non-committal on the point.

Premier Drury asked and received the special consent for second reading of the bill dealing with the Kapuskasing situation. It was given second reading and put through committee of the whole this afternoon. The legislation provided for adjustment of the soldier-settlers' claims as recommended by the newly-appointed board of adjustment.

Opposition To Bill. Opposition to J. W. Curry's bill, which would hold municipalities responsible for damage done to property during riots, developed in the Legislature this morning. It was after its second reading the measure was referred back to the municipal committee.

The bill is retroactive to January 1, 1917. Hon. C. H. Ferguson was inclined to view the measure as a dangerous one, while Hon. Thomas Crawford declared that it embodied a vicious principle. W. A. Crockett, labor member for South Wentworth, expressed the fear that it might be placing a premium upon disorders.

Major J. C. Colville of Windsor approved the bill. Hon. W. E. Haney suggested that a special committee be appointed to consider it. Premier Drury, while approving the principle of the measure, sounded a note of caution, and asked that the bill go to the municipal committee, which was assented to.

LARGER GRANTS TO PROVINCIAL HOSPITAL

TORONTO, April 19.—Financial grants to provincial sanitariums and hospitals will be increased by \$400,000 this year, according to information furnished today by Hon. H. C. Nixon, provincial secretary.

The increases will be somewhat higher in the case of institutions for the care of tuberculosis as the new minister is endeavoring to lend every assistance to the fight against the white plague.

TABLES TURNED ON FOUR WITNESSES IN WOODSTOCK COURT

Men Must Now Answer To Charges of Burglary and Theft.

WOODSTOCK, April 19.—Four men from South Warwick walked into the police court this morning to act as witnesses in the case against George Trowhill, charged with stealing apples. They had been there only a few minutes, however, when Chief Killings was reading charges against them and placing them under arrest. The charges are as follows: John Parkes, charged with breaking into the dwelling of Robert Johnston, South Warwick, and stealing provisions; George Parkes, charged with breaking into the residence of Wesley King, Norwich, and stealing a quantity of household goods; Nelson Parkes, charged with unlawfully receiving stolen goods; and Alex. Parkes, charged with stealing a quantity of apples. The men were remanded to jail.

LONDON MAN SUED FOR \$10,000 FOR BREACH OF PROMISE TO MARRY

WALKERTON, April 19.—Action has been entered on behalf of Miss Julia Norn Knowles of Lucknow by O. E. Klein, barrister of this town, against John Sherman, produce dealer of London, for \$10,000 for alleged breach of a promise to marry. Miss Knowles, who is an English girl, had been employed as a waitress at the Kane House, Lucknow, for several years. During last fall, it is said, the defendant made this house his headquarters for some time while engaged in buying up large supplies of potatoes. While there, it is alleged, he made himself very friendly and gained the confidence and friendship of the plaintiff and later made her an offer of marriage, which she accepted.

On the strength of the offer of marriage, plaintiff states that she left her situation and had been put to considerable expense preparing for the event, to say nothing of her injured feelings.

The case will, it is expected, be heard at the fall sittings at Walkerton.

DAUGHTER SUCCEEDS HER FATHER AS ORGANIST

ST. THOMAS, April 19.—At an adjourned vestry meeting of the Trinity Anglican Church held tonight, Mrs. Henry Rose was appointed to succeed her father, J. H. Jones, as organist of the church. Mr. Jones, who was the first organist of Trinity Church, retired recently after 40 years' service.

GEDDES WOULD HAVE AMERICA IGNORE THE NEEDS OF IRELAND

Ambassador At New York Defends Lloyd George Moves.

NEW YORK, N. Y., April 19.—Sir Auckland C. Geddes, the new British ambassador to the United States, arrived here late today on the steamer Kaiserin Augusta Victoria from Liverpool. With Lady Geddes, he was taken aboard the revenue cutter Calumet at quarantine and landed at Battery Park. In an interview granted to newspapermen on his arrival, the new British ambassador expressed appreciation of the honor that had been conferred upon him, and dealt briefly with problems which confront Great Britain. Regarding the Irish question, he said: "In Ireland we are trying to provide political machinery whereby the antagonized sections of the Irish peoples can work out their own internal political salvation without economic ruin to Irish interests. When the new home rule bill becomes operative it will be the duty of all British subjects who are not domiciled in Ireland, to stand aside and leave those who live there to solve their problems. I venture to add that it will be also helpful if the many in all parts of the world, who are not British subjects but are interested in Ireland, likewise stand aside."

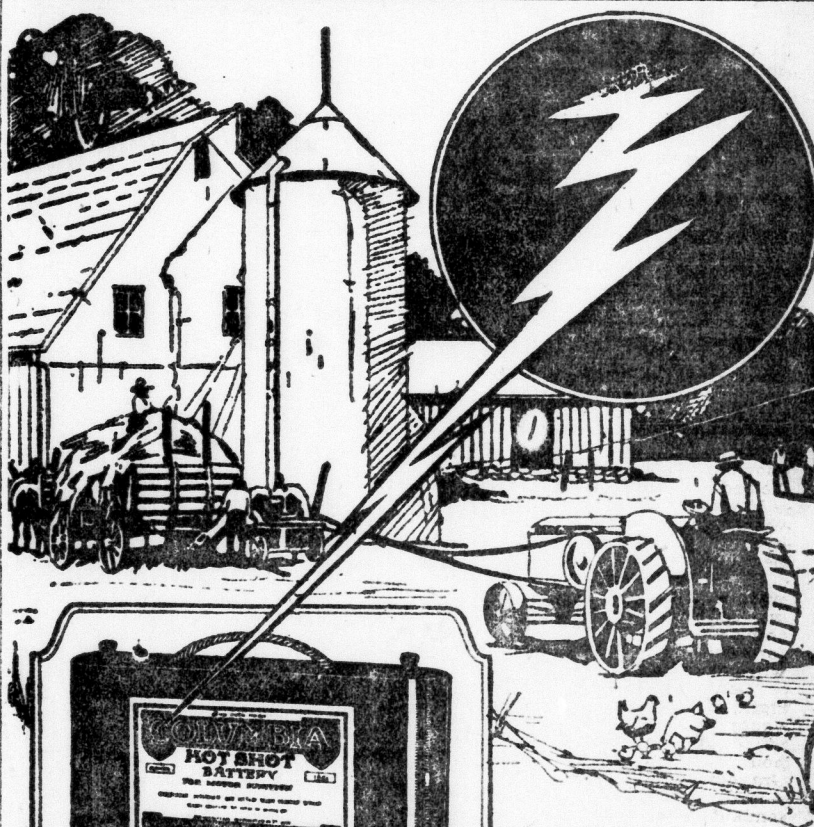
